

## **COMPETITION COLUMN**

### **Doug Wolters, Competition Chair**

The topic for this month - the last competition for the 2014 - 2015 season - is abstracts. Here is the definition:

*Abstracts fundamentally depend on transformation or creation of the subject. While perhaps difficult to define and difficult to determine the boundaries, abstract photographs share some basic characteristics. Though some may contain identifiable subject matter, the principal emphasis is on pattern or even chaotic lack of pattern, line, form, tone, texture, color, depth of field, blur, and / or focus.*

*Abstracts may be "created," for example by light-painting or by actually constructing a subject. Or they may be "found," for example, by photographing an everyday object so that it is visually transformed into something essentially non-representational. Usually, abstracts do not give the viewer a visual reference to the world he's familiar with.*

*For the photographer, abstracts give free rein to an intensely personal style and creative experimentation. For the viewer, the reaction to an abstract is primarily emotional and highly subjective. The most frequent response is, "What am I looking at?"*

Abstracts are an especially exciting topic. They can encompass almost any type of photography - from macro to architecture, from light painting to camera swipes, from photos manipulated in the computer to photos straight from the camera. I'm looking forward to seeing the variety of images that will be submitted!

You can begin planning ahead for next year's competitions. Competitions in September, November, January, and March will be open. October, as always, will be nature. December will be landscapes; February, industrial - mechanical; and April, still lifes. For May, we will have another black & white / monochrome competition -

important since it re-affirms the importance of this medium.

It has been very rewarding for me to be the competition chair this year, and I am looking forward to next year.

## **MAY SPEAKER: LEW LORTON ON STREET AND TRAVEL**

For our last speaker's night of this season, we present the iconoclastic Lew Lorton, who actually has a temperament like a lot of us. In his professional background, Lew had a long and checkered career as an Army officer, VP of a statistical consulting company, CIO of a health care research organization, Executive Director of a technology consortium, and finally the founder of a small Internet company.



He has been married for a very long time and has five grown children, including two sons named Michael.

Lew says that realizing at last that he was wasting a great deal of time working, he retired and got pretty serious about photography. (Sounds like many of us!) Since mountains, trees, and buildings don't move very much and most wildlife moves too quickly to catch, he didn't see either of those kinds of photography as much of a fit with his temperament. So...he began to concentrate on shooting pictures of people. He used to shoot with full frame Nikons but has switched to mirrorless cameras - Sony A7 II and Olympus OM-D E-M5. He loves prints more than screen images.

A return trip to Vietnam aroused Lew's love of South East Asia and its various peoples, and he

has been back there several times – three times to Myanmar, three times to Vietnam, twice to Laos, and once to Cambodia. Each of these trips started and ended with some time in Thailand.

His most recent trip was in February, 2015 when he traveled through the north of Thailand and over the border into Laos up near China, all by bus and boat. Lew has never gone on a tour and prefers to travel *ad hoc* with only a faint schedule and a plane reservation home.

His love of street photography influences the photos he takes while traveling, and in Lew's May presentation, he'll talk about how that all fits together.

## EMILY REID CAMPBELL JUDGES ABSTRACT COMPETITION

For the culmination of our exploration of abstracts this season, we celebrate with this month's competition on abstracts. By now, many SSCC members are old hands with this topic. We've created abstracts for our group exhibit, and many of us have been juried in – again – to Joe Miller's annual abstracts exhibit.

Finding a judge for this topic was a bit tricky. We wanted someone with a special interest in abstracts but someone with a new perspective to which we haven't been exposed before. Emily Reid Campbell is just that person.



Also known as "dcemmy," Emily is an abstract, architectural, conceptual, and experimental landscape photographer and web designer. She's a member of InstantDC, ExposedDC staff, AMPt,

and several other photography, web design, and digital media organizations. Her work has been featured in local galleries and exhibits, as well as on many national and international photography websites.

For Emily, the primary focus is on architecture, in both "standard building" and abstract forms, and though she enjoys branching out into other photography styles and genres, this is her true passion. She is fascinated by lines, patterns, and angles – and she loves finding new ways to use these to create unique art forms and alternative perspectives.

## THE YEAR-END COMPETITION

The year-end competition is different from all the other competitions of the club year.

For all the other competitions, you get tangible rewards – ribbons and points. For the year-end competition, there is only one tangible award presented, an award for the best in show. Otherwise, there are no ribbons, no points. Just the satisfaction of having submitted a picture judged to be amongst the best of the entire year!

There are awards given at the end of year celebration, but those are based only on the number of points a member has earned – the Star Merit awards, the Master of Photography award, the Grand Master of Photography.

For the year-end competition, as in any other competition, the judge will select first, second, and third place winners, and as many honorable mentions as the numbers of entries require. The winners' names will be announced at the Awards Celebration. Here are some of the other features of the year-end competition:

- All images must be selected from images already submitted to SSCC competitions during the 2014-2015 year.
- The judging is "closed"; it is not held at a regular club meeting.
- Each member may select up to five projected images and five prints (10 images in all) to submit.
- Entries do not have to have won an award to be entered!
- If a member has competed in both the Novice and Advanced levels this year, the rules stipulate that he/she "may elect to enter either the Novice or the Advanced level (but not both) for the Year-End competition. If the member enters the Advanced level, he or she may submit any entry previously entered regardless of level. However, if he or she enters the Novice level, he or she may submit only entries previously entered in the Novice level."
- A best in show award will be given, known as the Len Tuchin Award.

By now, you will have received a list of all the images you have submitted through April, both projected and prints. Please carefully review the directions on how to submit your choices for the year-end competition!

The absolute drop-dead deadline to deliver your prints at a regular meeting is May 14; for projected selections, they must be emailed no later than May 17.

I am happy to report that everyone seemed to have a very informative and very enjoyable time.


Michael had set up 3 tables with a judge at each one. The judges were Steve Shapiro, Beth Eichols, and Dave Powell.

## **FIELD TRIP TO SAVAGE MILL Savage, Maryland, May 31, 2015**

### **This location includes:**

River Trail, Ruins, Antique Mall, Bollman Truss Railroad Bridge, Ram's Head Tavern, and Bonaparte Breads bakery.

While I lived in Columbia, Savage Mill was one of my favorite places to go. It combines some history, nature and food options, but has seen better days. (The trail is short, (and no nudity!!) the shopping area has lots of vacant shops, the food is so-so.) Still there is a certain charm to it, and I think it's worth a visit. I think 2 hours of shooting, and then lunch at about 12 noon would be realistic. I might be able to reserve a private room for us at the Ram's Head, but I will need a head count for that. ### **Directions:**

- From D.C., take the beltway to I-95 North exit toward Baltimore.
- Get off 95 at MD Rt. 32 East
- Take 32 E to US Rt. 1 South, get in the right lane
- Take Rt 1 South to Howard Rd, turn Right at Howard (traffic light)
- Howard bears to the left and merges with Baltimore St, stay on that to the end
- Left at Fair St, enter parking lot for Savage Mill

To get to the Bollman bridge and the river trail you can either go around or through the Mill buildings and head to the Gorman Rd. entrance to the project (there is limited parking at that end).




# BIRDS OF PREY AT THE CARRIE MURRAY NATURE CENTER


A few times a year, the Carrie Murray Nature Center in Baltimore offers photographers a unique experience to photograph birds-of-prey up close and personal. On Saturday, March 28, 2015, the center hosted its "Spring Wild Images," when several resident injured and orphaned birds-of-prey were brought out into their natural environment to be photographed. Unfortunately, this day happened to coincide with the SSCC's monthly field trip to Cunningham Falls. However, several photographers from other photography clubs were in attendance. The center noted that if a photography club is able to get 10 or more participants, it would offer a private session to photograph the birds.



During the photo shoot, which lasts 3-4 hours, the center brings out one bird at a time and tethers the bird to a low-hanging branch or fence. Photographers can get quite close (approximately 10 feet) to the birds for about 20-30 minutes per bird. On this day, we were treated to nine different birds including a



barred owl, a barn owl, a red-tailed hawk, a great horned owl (two different ones), a turkey vulture, an American kestrel, an Eastern screech owl (gray phase), and a black vulture. Each bird has a unique characteristic and personality that becomes apparent after spending some time with each of them. They are somewhat friendly and accustomed to being photographed. To photograph the birds, it is best to have a long telephoto lens in the 200-400mm range. A tripod is useful, but not absolutely necessary. A long telephoto lens, however, does get a little heavy after a while.



The next scheduled photo shoot of the birds of prey is on Saturday, August 15, 2015, when the center will host its "Summer Wild Images" day. The Carrie Murray Nature Center is located at 1901 Ridgetop Road, Baltimore. It is located in Gwynns Falls/Leakin Park and is one of the largest parks of its kind in the nation. There are miles of nature trails available. The center also has an insect zoo and live reptiles and amphibians on display inside. # THE PERFECT BACKPACK?

In addition to the search for the perfect lens, filter, and tripod, photographers are constantly on the hunt for the perfect camera bag, preferably one that fits your entire gear closet while weighing less than a baby's kiss. I have found a good enough shoulder bag, but I was struggling to find the perfect backpack.

One of the common failings of most camera backpacks is that they are great in getting your gear to a location, but when you want to get out your camera and set up the shoot, you have to set the camera down on the ground. That's nice in a dry, clean location, but a downside when you are on a snowy hillside or a dusty abandoned factory. There are several brands that offer access from openings facing the wearer's back, such as the LowePro Flipside (<http://www.lowepro.com/flipside>) or f-stop's Mountain series (<http://fstopgear.com/>). However, accessing gear without setting the bag down is still an awkward process that looks a little unstable in the field.

The creators of Think Tank Photo have set up a new company, MindShift Gear (<http://www.mindshiftgear.com/>), with a different approach: combining a backpack with a waistpack that rotates around to offer access to your camera and lenses without ever setting the pack down. The waist belt carries the load when hiking with the bag, but after loosening the belt and releasing a catch, the gear compartment swings around. It may be hard to understand in theory, but here is a quick video that explains the concept ([http://youtu.be/V\\_HInTpEc1w](http://youtu.be/V_HInTpEc1w)). These pictures show me wearing the pack with the waistpack stowed and deployed.



I purchased the rotation180 Panorama, and the waistpack is large enough to hold a consumer-grade APS-C DSLR with an attached lens and two other lenses (left). It easily swallows my micro43 camera with kit lens and three other lenses (right). It also has tripod-carrying points that stow away neatly to keep the clean lines of the pack. The upper compartment has space for additional photo gear, a jacket, lunch, etc.



If you want to carry a pro-grade DSLR and several lenses in the waistpack, look at their Professional model, and there are smaller models that would be good for holding a P&S and a small tablet computer.

I have had this backpack for a little over a month, and I am loving it. At Cunningham Falls, I went off-trail to find some better pictures and was able to swap lenses, unstrap and set up my tripod, and access my neutral density filters without ever setting the bag down in the muddy conditions. And when the going got rough, it was easy to stow the camera yet access it quickly when the photographic opportunity arose. During a subsequent trip to the beach, I could switch from a wide-angle lens to catch the dunes and clouds to a telephoto lens to photograph dolphins cresting in the waves without setting the bag down in the sand.

This backpack is not the place to store your gear, however. Once you take it off, it is slightly awkward to access the camera. I will live with that downside in exchange for easy, quick, safe access to my gear in the field.

This bag is not cheap at \$200 but reasonable when I compare it to the annoyance of my other backpack, which nearly caused me to lose a lens when I didn't realize that the bottom compartment was open when I picked the bag up. (My Canon 55-250mm lens still has a broken filter ring from that mistake.)

I bought mine through B&H, but according to the MindShift website, they are stocked at Ace Photo (Ashburn, VA), Photo Craft (Burke, VA), and Service Photo (Baltimore, MD).

On a visit to the Museum of Modern Art in New York, I saw a staircase off to the side, away from the galleries. The strong shape of its railing, and the soft reflection in the white glass, created an interesting geometric abstraction. Converting the image to black & white in Nik Silver Efex Pro, I emphasized the contrast and texture of the reflection and gave the railing itself a stronger presence. The effect reminded me of a Mondrian composition, minus the blocks of color. Details: Canon PowerShot G15. Exposure: 1/125 sec at f/7.1. Focal length: 24mm. ISO: 800.

The requirements for submitting images for digital projection are:

### Submission Deadline

- Midnight 1-week before competition (SSCC's Speaker meeting night)
  - Send submissions to [SSCCphotography@yahoo.com](mailto:SSCCphotography@yahoo.com)
  - Images (per member per competition): maximum of 2
- File Format: JPEG
- File Size: 500 KB (max)
- File Name: **Level ~Maker's Name~Image Title.jpg**
  - Example: Advanced~Tom Jones~Washington Landscape.jpg
  - The tilde (~) character separates the 3 sub-fields of the file name
  - **Level** - "Novice" or "Advanced" (capitalization not required)
  - **Maker's Name** - spaces allowed
  - Please use the same name throughout the year to aid record keeping.
  - **Image Title** - spaces allowed

DO NOT embed commas (,) or tilde (~) in any of the File Name sub-fields.

The "**File Name**" requirements are very important for running the competition. Please be careful when entering this information. Nonconforming filenames make it very difficult to track your entry. Use a tilde (~), NOT a dash (-) to separate the subfields (**Level~Maker's Name~Image Title**) of the filename. The Competition Chair will not make changes to the filenames after submission, so please check them carefully before submitting.

The computer and software will automatically rescale your image for projection, but if you want to exert full control over how the image is displayed, you should consider resizing and sharpening the image (maximum of 1024 pixels wide and 768 pixels high) yourself. Please see the *Member Handbook* (<http://www.ssccphotography.org/wp-content/uploads/2014/08/SSCC-Member-Handbook2014.pdf>) for tutorials on how to resize images in Lightroom or Photoshop.

The maximum file size of **500KB** is to limit the demands on computer memory and speed the presentation.

The computer we use for competition night will automatically add black bars at the side of the photo based on the photo's aspect ratio. If for artistic reasons you wish your image to be presented at a size smaller than screen's full height or width, then you must size your image and position it within a 1024 pixels wide x 768 pixels high **black** background image (canvas size in Photoshop).
