PROJECTED ENTRIES DUE JANUARY 2 BY MIDNIGHT

CLARIFICATION OF DIGITAL COMPETITION REQUIREMENTS

The specifications for digital competitions have caused some concern and confusion among members. So much so that it has probably discouraged some members, especially Novices, from submitting entries. Although computer applications can sometime have very exact technical requirements, experience has taught us that some of what we thought were requirements could better be termed recommendations.

We have, therefore, loosened the submission requirements to eliminate the "Image Dimensions," which seemed to be the most confusing of all the requirements. The maximum width (1024) and maximum height (768) will no longer be requirements. The software automatically adjusts the size of projected images (larger or smaller) to the capabilities of the computer/projector. You can control that by setting the dimensions yourself or let the software do it. It's up to you. If for artistic reasons you wish your image to be presented at a size smaller than full screen, then you must size you image and position it within a 1024 pixels wide x 768 pixels high **black** background image (canvas size in Photoshop).

The maximum "**File Size**" (not to be confused with Image Dimensions), which remains at **500KB**(max), is mainly because of limited computer disk space.

The "**File Name**" requirements are very important and are dictated entirely by the software. Please be careful when entering this information. Nonconforming filenames can wreak havoc with the software. Use a tilde (~), NOT a dash (-) to separate the subfields (**Class~Maker's Name~Image Title**) of the filename. It is OK to include spaces within the name and image title subfields. Changes (or corrections) will NOT be made to the subfields; i.e., inserting spaces, changing spelling, etc. You picked the subject . . . you picked the title. Who's to question that?

The **<u>Requirements</u>** are now:

- Submission Deadline
 - Midnight 1-week before competition (SSCC's Speaker meeting night)
 - Send submissions to <u>SSCCphotography@yahoo.com</u>
- Monthly Images per member 2 (max)
- File Format JPG
- File Size 500 KB (max)
- File Name: Class ~Maker's Name~Image Title.jpg
 - Example: Adv~Tom Jones~Washington Landscape.jpg
 - The tilde ~ character separates the 3 subfields of the file name
- **Class** Nov or Adv (capitalization not required)
- Maker's Name spaces allowed
- Please use the same name throughout the year to aid record keeping.
- Image Title spaces allowed
 - o DO NOT embed commas (,) or tilde (~) in any of the File Name <u>subfields</u>

The <u>Suggestions</u> are:

- Image Dimensions
 - o 1024 pixels wide (max)
 - o 768 pixels high (max)
- Color Space sRGB

PRINT IMAGE ENTRY GUIDELINES

Mark the BACK of the matte with category (e.g., Novice Color), photographer's name, title of the image, and an arrow indicating the print's correct orientation. (See at right)



COMPETITON COLUMN Doug Wolters

January's competition is open. To review the definition:

Open - Any subject matter, theme, and technique are acceptable. The principal emphasis should be on photography and should show the personal interpretation of the photographer.

The competition in February will be all about water. For me, it's always useful to have a long time to prepare for a themed competition. In that spirit, the definition for next month's competition is:

February: Water in any of its forms - *Entries under this topic show water in the broadest possible sense. They depict rain, mist, fog, frost, snow, ice, clouds, glaciers, waterfalls, oceans, puddles, city fountains, oases, or ice cubes in a glass, etc. Any subject and technique are acceptable as long as the principal emphasis is on the type of water (e.g., the rapids and not the kayaker, the fountain and not the children playing in it).*

OPEN COMPETITION JUDGE: SANDI CROAN

If you've attended the Nature Visions Expo in the last couple of years, you've seen Sandi Croan and her award-winning photographs. In Northern Virginia circles, Sandi's well known for landscape, nature, and travel photography, with an eye for capturing the unique and for creating fine art for homes and offices.

As an independent photographer, Sandi has won numerous competitions and awards, including Photographer of the Year and Print of the Year by the Northern Virginia Photographic Society. She's also won Best In Show and Second Place at the juried Meadowlark Photo Expo in Vienna. Her images have been selected to be put on permanent display at Meadowlark Botanical Gardens and the Joseph Miller Center for the Photographic Arts. Sandi has been juried into numerous art shows including the VisArts exhibitions in Rockville, the Fairfax County Council of the Arts Show, and The Fraser Gallery International

Photography Exhibition. Sandi was a featured artist in *Elan* magazine, and her photograph "Blue Lagoon" appeared on the cover. She has also had other photographs published in local and national magazines.



Sandi has sold many of her photographs to

private, corporate, and government clients, and she does exhibits for businesses and special local events. She also displays her work at public and private venues such as civic centers and restaurants.

Since 2004, Sandi has been an active member of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society, serving on numerous board positions. She held the title of president of NVPS for two terms, from 2009-2011. Sandi speaks and judges frequently for metro area camera clubs and other exhibitions.

JANUARY SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER: DAVE POWELL

Our speaker this month is familiar to all SSCC members: Dave Powell, who now runs the Members' Open Forum on 4th Thursdays. And what a resource he is for SSCC! Dave joined SSCC a couple of years ago as one way to give back to the profession that's been sustaining him for 50 years. Few of us, however, are familiar with Dave's background, so we've asked him to kick off the new year by talking about his experiences, emphasizing his primary area of interest – lighting and light.

In his decades as a professional photographer, Dave has used a wide range of photo gear, lighting equipment, and film and video equipment. He has shot on assignment in all 48 contiguous states and has photographed in many locations overseas. While now somewhat retired, Dave continues to do limited assignment work for clients. Dave has used various media to tell stories that illustrate and bring to life the high impact, high visibility, high pressure, and fast moving worlds of business, schools, museums, and government. He helps his clients refine, clarify, and heighten their

messages so they can increase sales, boost fund-raising, or educate. Surprising to us, perhaps, is the fact that Dave is far more than a very successful commercial photographer. He's an award-winning film and documentary maker and the creator and producer of video and multi-screen slide shows. He's written and



edited scripts. He's served as advisor on AV equipment and graphic software packages. He's also a web designer and a one-on-one executive coach for public speaking and presentations.

Here an example of a typical assignment for Dave: He created and produced two complex, multiimage, multi-screen slide shows for National Gallery exhibitions, which were used to give historical and thematic perspectives. In another example, Dave created an anti-smoking film commissioned by the government aimed at students – for which he won an Emmy Award.

Since 1990, Dave has been the owner of David W. Powell Communications. Earlier, he held the responsibilities of partner in several communications media firms after serving as a producer/director at WETA and Voice of America.


Dave's client list fills pages; outstanding assignments have come from the World Bank, the CIA, University of Maryland, AT&T, British Airways, GEICO, Exxon Corporation, Hillwood Museum, Georgetown University, and the Egyptian government.

In his own education, Dave received his BA in Radio, Television, and Film Production at the University of Maryland, with an emphasis on public speaking and music. He also plays a mean saxophone.

SSCC FIELD TRIPS

GET READY EVERYONE AND GRAB YOUR TRIPOD! FIELD TRIP TO THE RAWLINGS CONSERVATORY, BALTIMORE, MARYLAND JANUARY 25, 2014

The SSCC will be visiting the Rawlings Conservatory and Botanic Gardens of Baltimore on Saturday January 25, 2014.

The Rawlings Conservatory, established by the City of Baltimore in 1888, is located in historic Druid Hill Park. The Conservatory includes five distinct environments ranging from South American rainforests to



the world's deserts with an extraordinary variety of plants. The Mediterranean House replicates the dry summers and foggy winters of the Mediterranean basin and southern California. The Tropical Forest greenhouse displays the plants that originate in the tropics, including those native to parts of Africa, Asia, the Americas, Australia and some tropical islands. The Desert Greenhouse showcases plants that can endure the harsh, windy, and arid conditions of the deserts where temperatures can climb as high as 125 degrees Fahrenheit and fall as

low as 10 degree at night. The Orchid Room features the largest of all the plant groups – one in 10 of the earth's plant species is an orchid. The Palm House harkens back to the

Victorian era when plant collectors showcased plants from around the world in grand structures specifically designed to accommodate their requirement for a tropical environment.

Admission to the Conservatory is free; however, a donation is recommended. The volunteer staff is very friendly and helpful. This is one of the few indoor places where tripods are permitted.

We had a fun time shooting at the Conservatory last year, and a number of members have returned for additional opportunities to photograph in the Conservatory. After a couple of hours there, we had an enjoyable lunch in the Hampden neighborhood nearby. The neighborhood itself offers a rich and varied visual appeal, and several of the SSCC field-trippers took advantage of the opportunity to shoot on the street with good results.

Logistics:



Turn right into Druid Hill Park from Gwynns Falls Parkway (5th traffic light). Turn right immediately after entering the Park. The Conservatory is on the left.

DECEMBER'S MORMON TEMPLE FIELD TRIP



This image was shot from the roof of the building where I work at Connecticut and Florida. I was attempting to capture the "scene," the bright lights and colors, and the geometric shape of the four crosswalks. ISO 200, 28mm, f/11, 4.0s.







Shy Shorer, "Siesta"

This was taken couple of years ago in Barcelona. The empty street was a big contrast to the square that was literally feet away. There was little time for composing as I was only passing by. Taken with a Sony A35, 28-85mm at 85mm, f/4.5 (other data is missing) and was edited in Photoshop with NIK and Topaz plug-ins.

Robert Peters, "Shanghai Traffic" This picture taken while walking around Shanghai just after traffic light changed and at a safe distance away. This picture was taken with a 28-200 mm zoom at 112mm (x 1.5 crop factor) and cropped to about 2/3 of the original picture. I liked the expression of the lead motorcycle - so determined. The picture conveys the congestion in Shanghai. Exposure is f/9.5, 1/100s, ISO 400.

Jim Rogers, "View from Charminar (Hyderabad India)"

Charminar, a former mosque built in 1591, is a monument that has become a global icon. It is now a tourist attraction. Hyderabad, India without Charminar would be like New York without the Statue of Liberty or Moscow without the Kremlin. It is located at the intersection of 2 main thoroughfares in a thriving shopping area. This image of the bustling activity along one of those streets was taken from a couple of floors up. Canon EOS 20D, 20mm, 1/500s, f/10, ISO 200.

Coriolana Simon, "Night Icon"

The wintry gloominess of the Empire State Building at night reminded me of 1940s photographs and some paintings by Lyonel Feininger. The image seemed best rendered in a soft, dark sepia treatment. Details: Olympus micro four-thirds OM-D E-M5 with a 14-42mm lens at a focal length of 14mm (28mm equivalent); exposure 1/10 sec at f/3.5; ISO 1600; handheld; minor editing in Lightroom 4; conversion to monochrome in Silver Efex Pro.



Robert Peters, "Boy with a boat" This picture was taken in a small village in China, where we spent half a day walking around. I liked the expression on his face and the body language toward the toy he is holding. The background hardware adds to the environment. The boy is standing by a round boat that is woven like a basket and then waterproofed, a very common boat in China. It takes skill to paddle to avoid going around in circles. Picture taken with a 28-300 mm zoom at 105 mm on a full frame camera; not cropped. Exposure is ISO 400, 1/750s, f/8.

Nick Williams, "Stairsteps to Nowhere" This photo was taken from a riverboat on the Seine in Paris last summer. In spite of the beautiful monuments in the background, I couldn't help but notice the interplay of the people along the banks of the river. This lady seemed like she was just lost in thought at the bottom of a staircase. Photo was taken with a Canon 5DMKII at f/5.6, 1/250s, ISO 200.





Bob Catlett, "Smile" Nikon D600, ISO 200, f/8, 1/320s with a 28-300 zoom lens. Taken in the canals of St. Petersburg, Russia

Michael Koren, "Window Treatments" I shot this in May of last year in the historic city of Dubrovnik, Croatia with my Nikon P7000 point and shoot. The lady was looking out from her second story window above the town square. I was looking at the painting and the puppets thinking it was unusual for someone to display such small objects as if they were for sale so far from a potential buyer. She happened to walk to the window and look out just before I shot the picture. It amused me to think she was looking out the window to check for customers. Exposure: 1/250s, f/5.6, ISO 200, 200mm. Processed with Nik Silver Efex Pro 2 and Photoshop.

This was taken in Vietnam on a rainy day. To protect the camera, I bought a cheap plastic raincoat and cut the sleeve off. I put the camera in the sleeve with the elastic end around the lens shade. This picture struck me because of the way both the ped-a-cab operator and woman were looking at the bike rider. The background (with trees) is all natural (the judge questioned that). The picture is cropped to about 1/3 the original size. Exposure info: ISO 560; f/6.7; 1/180s. Lens was a 28-300mm zoom at 150mm on a full frame camera.





Ice is a very interesting subject to study visually. Frozen water contains beautiful ice crystals; certain crystals can be seen with the naked eye, but most of them are so tiny that one would need the aid of a microscope. The best part of these photographs is the colors reflected by these ice "flowers;" it is a fascinating and wonderfully instructive study. I hope the viewer also enjoys the interaction of ice crystals and colorful lights.

Thanks to everyone that attended the December Education Night. The interactive, bring-your-ownlaptop experiment went well. As far as I know. this was a first for the Club and certainly a first for me as a presenter. Special thanks to Dave Powell for the foresight in bringing extra power strips and extension cords. BEAUTY OF THINGS INSUBSTANTIAL, INSIGNIFICANT AND UNTOUCHABLE Seminar by Tuan Pham

Last winter, Tuan Pham brought SSCC a presentation on Photographs of Nothing – a Zen approach to photography. Your response was immediate and enthusiastic. You'll now be interested to learn that Tuan is doing a presentation on February 8 at the U.S. National Arboretum as well as a series of Saturday workshops elaborating on this way of seeing.

Tuan says his goal is to "add a plus" to traditional photography, like a "new and improved" version. In his presentation, Tuan will tell stories and focus on some unique features of photography as a form of Zen art. These include an emphasis on:

- training the mind as well as the eyes
- finding beauty through feeling as well as through logic
- seeing life in transient states as well as moments of perfection
- valuing negative space in the same way as forms
- finding joy in photography in the process as much as in the product.

The series of workshops in the spring is based on the following building blocks:

- Relaxed attentiveness Learning takes place when the body is free of stress and the mind is free of "chatter." This freedom unlocks the door for the intuition, the same way a calm lake reveals the full moon.
- Words to keep Contemplating the enduring words of the Masters, both East and West, on "seeing"; e.g. "When the eyes see what they have never seen before, the heart feels as it has never felt."
- Creative exercises Fun exercises that seem to have nothing to do with photography but everything to do with creativity, to free the mind from attachments to labels, conformity, rules, fears, etc.



 Mindfulness meditation – Practice the mindfulness

of breathing, adapted from the ancient Buddhist Anapanasati discourse, specifically to cultivate harmony within and without, paving the way for clarity of vision and mind to appear.

- Look-and-learn Learning to see...with one eye looking out at the image, the other eye looking in for sensory responses, and to share that private communication between the viewer and the image with its makers.
- Weekly fieldwork assignments Helping to switch alliance from the safe but confined territory of the discriminating mind to the joyful and boundless world of mindfulness.

The last session of the workshop will be a creative exercise for participants and guests of all ages and a slide presentation of selected class images for all to enjoy.


