This was the evening the Silver
Spring Camera Club was priviledged to a
hear Mr. Elbridge C. Purdy, Instructor
of the U.S.D.A. Graduate School. The
Subject was "The Informal Portrait".
The Informal Portrait reveals a part of
yourself as a photographer. It presumes
a communication by the photographer

interpreting and identifying the kind of individual being portrayed. It need not be formal in technique, but must apply all the criteria of any photography. Mr. Purdy reminded his listeners that Portraitare ure is interpreting a three dimensional subject on a two dimensional plane; as the photographer must utilize color and light values to create the illusion of a third dimension. A repeated instruction by Mr. Purdy was Make pictures for frames rather than frames for pictures."

During the judging of the slides the members were treated to an instructional period as he told how to light a model, discussed distortion caused by the incorrect placement of the light source, warned all to be more careful of image placement before shooting, and illustrated that highlights proceed while shadows recede. Remember the trick of rapidly blinking the eyes while viewing a model or print to find the spot that attracts interest. So here was an evening to be remembered.

If the phototographer wishes to pay a 31.00 fee for each class and then may enter 8 prints and 8 slides.

All entries must be brought to the Arts Club from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 20th, or from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday February 21st.

Each print and slide must be identified, showing the title, name of photographer, and Camera Club represented. Color Slides must be properly thumbmarked.

Eliqible photographs are those which have received awards or homorable mention in your camera club or in competitions entered by your club. They must not have been shown previously at the Arts Club.

Members who submit for exhibition are cordially invited to the opening Tea, Sunday, March 7th, from 5:00 to 6:30 p.m.

The show is open to the public from March 8 through March 26, 1965, 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., except Wednesday when the gallery is open from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Color slides will be projected at 6:15 p.m, Sunday, March 7th and at 4:30 p.m., Sunday March 14th at the Arts Club.

All Maryland Camera Club Contest

Rules of entry:
The contest will include 6 separate divisions.

- Monochrome Prints--- Novice Class Maximum Print Size of 3"x10".
- 2. Monochrome Prints--- Advanced
 Amateur Class
 Maximum Print Size of 11"x14"
- Monochrome Prints --- Unlimited Class Maximum Print Size of 16"x20"
- .4. Color Transparencies --- No Classes
- 5. Photographs in Color---Novice Class
 Maximum Print Size of 8"x10"
- 6. Photographs in Color--- Unlimited
 Class
 Maximum Print Size of 16"x20".

Any <u>color technique</u> may be employed, such as multiple toning, dye transfer, carbo, wash off relief, hand coloring, etc. Each entry <u>must</u> be entirely the work

of the contestant, with the exception of the processing of negatives and transparancies, and the mounting of prints and slides.

Every print must bear on its back only the name and address of the maker, the class and club name. The title if any, may appear on the front and the back.

The number of prints or transparancies which may be entered by each club is 15 prints and 20 slides. No Club shall enter more than 3 monochrome prints, 3 prints in color and 3 transparancies from any member.

The last date for entry is February 18, 1965.

GUCCC Contest

The competition is divided into 3 11 classes as follows:

- a. Small Print Division--- prints not to exceed 11"x14". Mount may be any size, not to exceed 16"x20".
- b. Unlimited Print Division--- Any size print, mount to be 16"x20".

c. Color Transparancies--- 2"x2", and 2½"x2½" slides are eligible.

Individuals may compete in both monochreme classes and color.

Individuals are limited to 4 entries in the Unlimited Division, 3 entries in the small division, and 4 transparancies.

The Club selects the entries to fill the quotas of 20 entries in Unlimited; 15 in Small Division; and, 30 transparancies.

Prints must bear the sticker label provided and completely filled out as required.

Transparancies must bear the name of the ma ker, the club, the title and be properly thumbmarked.

The judging will take place at the National 4-H Center, 8100 Connecticut Avenue, on Saturday, March 27, 1965 at 9:00 a.m.
