

"PRIZE WINNING PHOTOGRAPHY" MAKES A HIT. summarized by Dolores L. Klumpp.

"Animals are people with feathers or fur, "said Mrs. Eileen G. Galer, of the Animal Welfare League of Arlington, Virginia and SSCC guest speaker at the color meeting on December 3rd. Mrs. Galer, who is also President of the National Photographic Society, has successfully combined a love of animals with photographic skill to pro-

mote the work of the League.

The 116,865 animals of all kinds handled by the League in the past 20 years have provided Mrs. Galer with unlimited subject material, not only for her prize winning photographs, but for illustrations for publications such as "Cats" magazine and the Animal Welfare League Bulletins. Her slide show on these animals has been viewed by over 3000 people in clubs, civic associations and schools in the Washington area as part of the humane education program of the League.

Although she has photographed hundreds of different animals, both wild and tame, --- doge, owls, horses, goats, lions, snails, mothe and turtles--- Mrs. Galer admits that cats are her favorite pets and told some of her methods of photographing them.

"A cat should be set in its background like a jewel", she said, and added that an uncluttered one-color background, perhaps the color of the cat's eyes, sets off the beauty of the subject best. And judging from the number of awards her pictures have received, this ought to be good advice for our animal photographers in the club.

Some of the activities of the Animal Welfare League were called to our attention by Mrs. Galer, who reminded us that no efforts are spared in their work to rescue and care for animals. They have even provided an airline ticket to an egret when its broken wing had healed too late for it to migrate to Florida in the customary way.

Our special thanks to Mrs. Eileen Galer for a very entertaining and informative show.



# WHAT'S NEW?

of the ready-mounts used essing Laboratories has been antly in order to provide eased projection stability.

With conventional cardboard mounts, film movement requiring refocusing may occur when the heat from the projection lamp reaches the slide. The rapid loss of moisture from the emulsion causes temporary shrinkage, forcing the film to assume a slightly dished form. When this occurs rapidly, it is often described as "Popping".

The new mount design features embossing around the aperture, a "frame", which gently forces the film to assume a slight curvature. Since the film is held in the position it would otherwise assume after "popping", little or no additional movement will take place during projection.

The improved mounts are now in use for 35mm transparancies at the Rochester, Findlay and Mashington laboratories. It is anticipated that their use will be extended to other Kodak Processing Laboratories in the United States early in 1965.

Quickie-Quiz (U.S. Camera) from The Focal Point

In black and white photography to make a color appear a lighter grey use a filter of: (a) the same color (b) the opposite color (c) A polarized filter.

Answer. (a) Use a filter of the same color. If, for instance, you want to make blue appear lighter than it is, use a blue filter. However, to make a color appear darker, use a filter of the opposite color—— for instance a yellow filter makes blue darker.
