Almost as hard as remembering to return your badge to the club secretary at the end of the meeting. Please return them to make this system effective.

Technical Notes

As an addendum to Irene Weidler's workshop session, she raises the oftrepeated bogie of the unsafe safe-light. Like disaster, which always seems to strike someone else, the danger is more real when it hits someone we know. It could even happen to you!

Irene suggests placing bits of photographic paper at strategic points around the darkroom and leaving them to bask in the glow of your "safe" light. Then collect, develop, and examine.

Most important is to avoid the assumption that a new light must be safe. The Weidler's type AO Wratten, fresh from the package, was in her word, "horrible." She is now on her third safe light. It is worth a few sheets of paper to make this test.

My own approach is slightly different. A simple wiring modification can eliminate much of the damage which excessive safe-light exposure can cause. A so-called "double-pole, double-throw" toggle switch, rated at two amps can be wired to both your enlarger and safe light. This switch is available at electronic supply stores for about one dollar.

Solder your two supply leads to the center terminals of the switch, the enlarger lamp leads to one remaining set of lugs, and your safe-light lead to the other. Thus, when in one position, the enlarger lamp is energized and the safe light is off. The opposite position turns on the safe light and cuts out the enlarger. Thus, while printing, the safe light is not on to add to the fogging of your paper. When you turn off the enlarger, you have your safe light available for development.

- 3. Development of tremendous competence, technically and artistically among our members.
- 4. A single-mindedness of purpose among members. Photography is the principal if not the only subject of discussion at meetings. Enthusiasm breeds competence as much as anything else.

#### ARTS CLUB

1. The emphasis of the exhibition will be on pictorial quality. As pictorial art will be the governing criterion in selection for hanging, the size of the picture or mat is limited only by artistic consideration.

- 2. Each person may submit four prints or four color slides. If the photographer works in both color and black and white, he may submit four slides and four prints.
- 3. An entry fee of \$1.00 for each set of four pictures must accompany the entry.
- 4. Members who belong to another participating club may also submit pictures with that club, but not more than a total of eight prints and eight slides.
- 5. Each print and slide must be identified showing the title, name of the photographer, and camera club represented. Color slides must be properly thumb-marked in the lower left-hand corner as normally viewed.
- 6. Entries must not have been shown previously at the Arts Club.
- 7. All entries must be collected not later than one week after the show closes.
- 8. First, Second, Third, and Honorable Mention awards will be given for the most outstanding prints and for the color transparencies. Awards will be by a panel of competent judges.
- 9. Owners of photographs submitted assume all risks of damage or loss from fire or theft.

# GREATER WASHINGTON COUNCIL OF CAMERA CLUBS INTER-CLUB COMPETITIONS RULES

#### I. Classes

There shall be four classes in competition.

1. Monochrome --- Small Print.

Open to those members who have not received a medal award in any
G.W.C.C.C. competition. Prints to be no larger than 8" x 10". Mounts
may be up to a maximum of 16" x 20".

2. Monochrome--- Unlimited.

Open to all members of G.W.C.C.C. Clubs. Prints to be a maximum of 16" x 20". Mounts shall be 16" x 20".

3. Color Transparencies --- Novice.

Open to those members who have not placed in top ten during past three years of competition. Slides may be 2" x 2" or 2 3/4" x 2 3/4" mount size.

4. Color Transparencies --- Advanced.

Open to all members of G.W.C.C.C. Clubs. Slides may be 2" x 2" or 2 3/4" x 2 3/4" mount size.

II. Eligibility

The contests are open to any member of any club affiliated with G.W.C.C.C.

A contestant may participate through only one club.

A contestant may enter one of the monochrome classes plus one of the color classes.

The payment of \$1.00 covers the contestant's entire entry in the of the picture or met is limited only contest.

III. Submission of Entries A contestant may enter four monochrome prints and four color trans-

No prints or transparencies previously accepted in any G.W.C.C.C.

sponsored contest may be resubmitted.

Prints --- Each mount must bear on its back the title of the print, the name and address of the maker, the Club through which it was submitted. The print title must appear on the front of the mount. The maker's name on the front of the print is optional. Transparencies --- Each color transparency must bear the name of the

maker, the title and the name of the Club through which submitted. Slide must be thumbmarked in the lower left hand corner as normally viewed. Glass over cardboard is not acceptable. Since the slides are handled in extremely dim light, it is very important that this

information be neat and legible.

IV. Medals and Awards

G.W.C.C.C. Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals will be awarded to the individual makers of the First, Second and Third Place in each class.

Suitable recognition will be given to the entries deserving Honorable Mention.

V. General

All possible care will be exercised, but no responsibility will be assumed by the G.W.C.C.C. for any losses or damage during the exhibition. Rules not specifically mentioned shall be in accordance with good exhibit practices.

# ALL\_MARYLAND CAMERA CLUB INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION

## THE RILLES OF ENTRY

- B" X 10", Mounth 1. All prints and color transparencies entered in the All-Maryland Contest will be judged in open session on a day and date selected by the Council of Maryland Camera-Clubs.
- 2. No prints or transparencies may be entered that have been entered in any previous All-Maryland Camera Club Contest.
  - 3. Every print must bear on its BACK ONLY the name and address of the maker, the class and club name. The title, if any, may appear on the front and back. Prints may be mounted on any size mounting board up to 16" x 20" maximum, to be hung vertically or horizont-3/4" X 2 3/4" mount wills ally.

All transparencies must bear title, name of maker and club, and must be marked as viewed in the lower left corner. All transparencies not properly marked will be eliminated. All possible care of prints and transparencies will be exercised, but no responsibility will be assumed by the Council for any loss or damage in transit or during the exhibition.

- 4. Prints or transparencies may be entered by each club in each division as designated. No club may enter more than three monochrome prints and three prints in color and three transparencies from any one member.
- 5. Each entry must be entirely the work of the contestant, with the exception of the processing of negatives and transparencies, and the mounting of prints and slides.
- 6. The Contest will include six (6) separate divisions:
  - A. MONOCHROME PRINTS NOVICE CLASS: Contestants in this class must be individuals who, in their own club contests, compete in the "novice" or "beginners" class. All Novice Class prints are limited to a maximum print size of 8" x 10". Winners of either a first, second or third place award will be moved up to the Advanced Amateur Class.
  - B. MONOCHROME PRINTS ADVANCED AMATEUR CLASS: Contestants in this class must be individuals who, in their own club contests, compete in the "advanced amateur" class. Prints in this class are limited to a maximum print size of ll" x 14". Winners of an aggregate of three (3) awards (representing either a first, second or third place) will be advanced to the Unlimited Class.
  - C. MONOCHROME PRINTS UNLIMITED CLASS: Contestants in this class may be any member not competing in the Novice Class or Advanced Amateur Class.
  - D. COLOR PRINTS NOVICE CLASS: Contestants in this class must be individuals who have not won a lst, 2nd, or 3rd place medal in the Color Print Class of the All Maryland Contest. Any size print up to 8" x 10" may be entered in this division. Any color technique may be employed, such as multiple toning, dye transfer, direct color printing, hand colored prints, etc.
  - E. COLOR PRINTS ADVANCED CLASS: Contestants who have won a lst, 2nd, or 3rd place medal in the Color Print Class of the All Maryland Contest must compete in this class. Any size print up to 16" x 20" may be entered in this division. Any color technique may be employed, such as multiple toning, dye transfer, direct color printing, hand colored prints, etc.
  - F. COLOR TRANSPARENCIES NO CLASSES: Transparencies must be mounted for projection, and no larger than  $2\frac{1}{4}$  x  $2\frac{1}{4}$ .
