ALL-MD TRIP TO VERMONT?

The All-Md CCC is considering sponsoring a bus trip to Vermont the first weekend in October. It may seem a little early to be mentioning it, but a trip like this does take advance planning and the Council would like to know if there is enough interest to proceed with arrangements. If you think you would like to take part in this adventure, please contact Bernie Blass.

Failure to observe a few basic rules causes much difficulty in conducting our monthly color slide competitions. You can do much to make the competition go more smoothly by referring to the check list below before entering your slides:

1. Marking the Slide Hold the slide the way you want it projected on the screen - the thumb spot should be placed in the lower left corner. This is the blank side of the mount as you get the slide back from the processor. The thumb-spot should be at least 1/4" in diameter and should be a dark color in contrast to the mount so it can be easily identified in the dark. The title of the picture should be on the mount on the same side as the thumb-spot. Your name should be on the back of the slide. This would be the side with the mark of the processor. Any other information such as exposure, where you took the picture, etc. will also go on this side. If you intentionally want your slide to be projected upside down, sideways, or backwards, mark your thumb-spot accordingly. The spot determines how the slide will be projected - don't blame the projectionist. 2. Entry in SSCC Competitions Make certain you are placing your slides in the correct class. Place one slide in each of the three rows of the tray with the thumb-spot at the top List the slides titles and your name in the log book for proper identification of Remember, the projectionist works in the dark. Double check to ensure that your thumb spots, name and title are in the proper place. The laughs generated by an upside down or backwards slide could be a factor in causing the judge to get less then the best possible

impression of your picture.

Anyone who has any ideas on categories for next years monthly competitions should notify a member of the Executive Board and it will be discussed at the next meeting. Ideas - on any aspect of club operation - are welcome at any time. If you think you have an idea which will make SSCC a better club let the Officers know. All suggestions are given thought and consideration at the Executive Board meetings.

Going on a trip? Planning to take the plane' If so, don't pack your film in your luggage. In these days of sky-jackers and mad bombers the airlines are resorting more and more to unobtrusive methods to uncover bombs, guns, etc. One method of determining if something is in a sealed piece of luggage is to X-ray it. Don't bother to ask at the check-in counter - they won't tell you (for obvious reasons). You will never know - until it's too late if they X-rayed or not. If you are taking film the safest way is to hand carry it aboard. Alternatives are to wait until you arrive at your destination and then buy the film (which could be more expensive) and then use prepaid mailers to mail your film home for processing or have it processed where you are if there is time. Of course mailing your film could be just as catastrophic as having it X-rayed and for Black & White you probably want to do your own processing anyway. Anyone for a travel1ing mini-darkroom?!

Please wear your name badge at meetings because otherwise we do not know who you are!

It's a funny thing about photo competitions the photographer who enters can't lose! No matter how hard those who sponsor competitions try to get judges who are impartial and objective, the actual judging is still a very subjective thing based on personal whims and prejudices. It is for this reason that I say you can't lose. If you win you can boast, "Yeah, that was a great photo - I deserved it". If you don't win you can say, "That guy was nuts". There is no losing - you can only gain from entering competitions. Of course it is frustrating to enter a photograph on which you've spent infinite hours and have it turned down as unacceptable. But that judge is only one person and it's not the end of the world. Besides, the criteria should not be "does the judge like it", but rather "do you, the photographer, like it". Winning competitions is not all there is to photography. If you think that winning is the end-all, then I truly believe that you are in the wrong business. Take up bowling or golf or some activity that will allow you to test your skill against someone else's without a third party passing judgement on you. Of course if you do this, you no longer have the convenient excuse of saying the judge was nuts! There are other benefits to be derived from entering photo competitions - it's just possible you'll learn something. Whether or not you agree with the judges comments, at least you've heard another viewpoint. Certainly if he says crop two inches off the the

Certainly if he says crop two inches off the the top of the print - and you do - and you end up with a 100% better picture - you haven't lost anything. Having your work critiqued by others is a very good way to learn. I feel it is especially important for the novice photographer to enter competitions because he can learn from his work which is a far superior method to reading textbooks and learning theory. I'm not knocking textbook theory, it is basic and important, but when you see theory applied to your own work you become more aware of the realities of the whole thing.

In the recent All-Md. Interclub competition SSCC did not even enter enough prints in the B&W Novice Class to make a decent showing. This is unfortunate because there are some fine prints shown in our monthly club competitions and it would have been nice if the members producing this work would see fit to enter the interclub as well. Last June at our year end competition there were not nearly as many entries as had been expected and yet the year end is our most important club-level competition. Don't feel that your work isn't good enough to compete - maybe

you're being overly self-critical. Don't think that because one judge said he didn't like your cat picture that you should put it in the attic - maybe he just didn't like cats. One thing is certain - you're never going to win -- if you don't enter!
