Candid Shots

from the President

It is a continuing source of amusement and amazement to me - the things that people take for granted about you when you are the President of an organization. One of the things is that as President you are automatically assumed to be an expert in the subject with which the organization is involved. In my own case, people often think I am an expert on Photography. I've always liked to define an expert as "a person who knows more and more about less and less until he knows everything about nothing". Hopefully I don't fit into that category! Seriously though I do get asked a lot of questions on various phases of photography. In fact, it was the preponderance of questions that led me to write Candid Shots in the first place. I thought that by writing on subjects of general interest I could both answer questions people asked me and pose questions to those who didn't. I've tried to make it clear throughout that I am writing opinion. I never said I was preaching the gospel and we have provided the opportunity for you to reply if you chose to. Personally I am glad I wrote the editorials. For one thing it helped me get some stuff off my chest and, for another, the favorable response has outnumbered the unfavorable by 10 to 1 so I feel that I have contributed something.

This month the question is the one most often asked me by the Novice photographer, "Are there any good photo courses available in the area?" Well, that's sort of like asking, "are there any good restaurants?" I could only tell you about the ones I've been to. There are many courses offered around the metropolitan D.C. area and obviously I have not taken all of them. I have taken six. I was disappointed in five, but that may not be the fault of the courses. You see, I'm sort of self-taught. When I got interested in photography I went to the library and the book stores and I got books and I read and learned photography. Then I decided to take some photography classes. What happened is that I felt that I could have taught every course I was in (except one) because they were all theory and I always seemed to be a year or two ahead of the subject matter. Obviously, if you are sitting there bored out of your mind, you aren't going to walk out at the end of the semester and say "what a great course that was!"

As I say, I am reluctant to blame the courses. I have no hesitancy at all, however, about blaming the idiotic administrators of the "adult education" centers who narrow-mindedly decree that "you must take course Y before you can take course Z". Dammit, if you belong in course Z you should be allowed to be in course Z! These days there are many elementary schools which have ungraded classes so that a child in the 2nd grade who can do 5th grade math can learn the 5th grade math. In "adult education" it seems that they are still in the dark ages. So... I caution all potential students to check out the course before you enroll. Preferably, talk to a former pupil and ask what was covered and how he liked it. If you already know the material, don't waste your time.

Another problem is not so easy to solve. Suppose you decide that you belong in course Y so you sign up. The first class is OK but you notice that there is a "slow Sally" in the back of the room who is having trouble understanding what an f stop is. As the weeks progress it becomes increasingly more evident that compared to Sally, Gracie Allen was a straight-man! Minutes and hours are wasted while the teacher tries to bring Sally up to the level the rest of the class was at two weeks ago. Why? Because the sole criteria for entrance into "adult education courses is that you have sufficient money to pay the tuition. When you are 18 and want to get into college you're subjected to everything but a full-field investigation by the FBI. But when you are all grown-up and want to go to "adult education" all you need is a few dollars. You might be just as stupid as you were at 18, but you're older so it's OK!

Obviously, there is no way you can know who is going to be in your class. When people ask me I tell them, "Forget basic photography courses unless you absolutely need them!" It's all in the books. Get the books and read them over and over. Then, take all the money you would have spent on twition and buy film, chemicals, etc. Take all the hours you would have spent in the classroom and take pictures and work in the darkroom. I wish I had done it - I'd be a lot better photographer today!

Another way to learn is to come to camera club meetings - all of them! Sometimes I wish we didn't label our meetings Mono and Color because people stay away from one or the other and miss a good workshop or program they might be interested in. Come to meetings. Talk to members. I learned more at SSCC then my dues could ever pay for.

You may have noticed that I said there was an exception to my photographic educational experiences. Indeed there was. One course stood out as worthwhile and I want to mention it. It is the course that Jim Johnson gives in his home. (Jim doesn't even know I'm writing this so forget payola!) The course is strictly for advanced workers so it is consistent with my idea of learning the basics yourself. Classes are small. If you don't belong in the course Jim won't take you. The price is reasonable. Possibly there are other courses like Jim's but I don't know about them. There are many in New York. If you have attended a class you felt was exceptionally worthwhile why not write to the Cable Release and let us know. We may all learn something!
