Candid Shots

from the President

Several months ago I heard an interview with John Canaday, Art Critic for the New York Times. He was asked the question, "Should artists be required to explain their work?" His answer was that "... artists should be prohibited from explaining their work." He then went on to discuss his reasons for the statement and, among other things, said that explanations by artists presented opportunities for "put-ons". The interview impressed me and I've been thinking about it ever since. The subject fits in nicely with the competition/judging questions that have been occupying my mind lately.

I've always had a very unintellectual viewpoint about art. I subscribe to the "beauty is in the eye of the beholder" theory or, to use another trite old expression, I don't know anything about art, but I know what I like. This, of course, is the wrong attitude according to all the experts. After all, how can you know what you like if you don't even know what you're looking at? My answer is that it makes no difference at all to me what I'm looking at. I don't care what it is or isn't supposed to be. I accept it at face value and if I like it for that, that is enough! I feel the same about poetry. In school it always blew my mind to have to read some poetic work which was totally incomprehensible to me and which the teacher had to explain line by line. Presumably, upon hearing an explanation of the poet's inner thoughts by your teacher, a revelation will occur and the whole poem will become crystal clear. Somehow, that part of the process escaped me!

To be sure, this unenlightened attitude could be torn to shreds by all the experts, critics and philosophers. However, I would like to say one thing in its defense. One who maintains an attitude about art based on egocentricity will never become the victim of "Emperor's Clothes Syndrome" Think about it - if you like what you like "just because you like it" without regard for the rules or tradition or critical analyses then no one is going to be able to tell you that what you like is bad or what you don't like is good. Oh, they can tell you, but you won't give a damm!

Now it's much the same way in photography. In fact, photography being an art form, it's exactly the same way. I think we can safely assume that most people take up photography as a hobby for reasons other then to just have something to occupy their time. It's probably a pretty good guess that photography is often chosen as a medium of self-expression. When you set out to express yourself, the first thing you don't need is someone else telling you how to do it. Let's use an example. The rules of composition state that you don't center your subject and you don't place your horizon through the middle. So along comes Larry Lenscap and he takes a picture with the horizon right through the middle and a tree in dead center ... and he likes it. I mean he thinks it's great! Not just another picture that he looks at and says maybe it needs this or that; this guy's got another Mona Lisa here. Now I'll admit that the vast majority of people would look at that picture, shake their heads and go "Tch tch tch". But we're not talking about most people, we're talking about Larry - and he likes his picture. He's expressing himself in his own way. So who the hell are we to tell him it's no good? Let's look at it another way. You take a picture that is perfect - every rule is followed - it's a classic study and Larry Lenscap doesn't like it. He looks at it, shrugs his shoulders and says, "So what?" Is he wrong? Absolutely not! He'd be wrong if he told you to change it - but you're wrong if you tell him to change his too!

Someone once said, "There is no such thing as a dull subject; there are only uninterested listeners". I think we can paraphrase that and say. "There is no such thing as a bad picture; there are only people who don't like it."

My underlying theme - in case you haven't gotten it - is a plea for individuality and selfexpression. If you're happy following the rules - if classic studies are your thing - great! If you want horizons through the middle of the picture and the tree in the center - do it! As Rick Nelson so aptly put it in his song, "Garden Party"

"It's alright now
I've learned my lesson well
You can't please everyone
So you've got to please yourself"
