The range is broad: basic and advanced amateur, professional, commercial, graphic arts scientific and educational materials. In addition to an alphabetical subject listing, the index includes items listed by areas of general interest. For example, most "amateur" materials have publication numbers within a range. Each item is listed by name, number, publication date, and a code number to indicate new or revised publications.

There are advantages if one orders by way of the index; an order puts you on the list for 1976 releases, you can acquire a batch of things in a single order, you can determine how current are your references, and you can find items which never seem to show up in the local camera emporium. Happily, there is an abundance of materials that remain within the nickel range.

# Happiness Through Photography

George Winnett excerpts from an article...

To the taker of snaps photography is a hobby, something that provides momentoes of holidays and family occasions. And that is quite a lot. photography has more to offer that just that. Anyone with a sense for the beauties of nature and a little artistic talent can hope to take at least one step up and try to photograph the beauty of a landscape, a flower, the graphic charms of a leafless branch. That, of course, calls for the gift of being able to see, a sense for aesthetic values -which are latent in most people, only waiting to be aroused. Enormous help is to be had from studying good examples, visiting museums and art exhibitions, analysing the photographs of the masters reproduced in the good periodicals. This enables the amateur to judge his own work better, which will certainly be capable of improvement. The one who is always trying to improve the quality of his work has reached the highest rung of amateur, for then if he produces a good picture, it will not be by mere chance, but because he has learned to see, which is the prime prerequisite of good photography making conscious choices and really composing. It is quite unnecessary to travel far in search of subjects, for these are everywhere; it is only a question of discovering and photygraphing them.

When you are producing good Photographs deliberately and not just by chance, there is no likelihood of your being bored or feeling that life is empty. Rather you will feel that you do not have enough time in which (continued next column) (Happiness - continued)

to photograph all the things worth photographing - the smile of an innocent child, the playfulness of a young animal, the activities of With this, of course, goes Nature. the developing of your own film and the enlarging, without which it is not complete photography. This is creative work, for which a craft must he learned and mastered, but, that done, there is a real art to be practiced. When it reaches this stage, photography becomes really satisfying and provides new dimension to your creativeness and so makes you happy.

# LEICAMANIACS

Do you collect Leicas? Then perhaps you are known as a Leicamaniac, says the Wall Street Journal. If you are one of these, beware of counterfeits!

A counterfeiter has been producing "A Model MP, designed especially for newspaper photographers. Only 395 were made in 1956 and 1957." "His artistry turns a Model M2, worth about \$225 to collectors, into a camera that brings \$1,800 to \$2,800, depending on whether it has a chrome finish or the preferred black-enamel finish. Besides being scarce, many MP models are valuable because they have notable histories. Robert Sperling has one that was once used to take photos of Nikita Khrushchev and Ernest Hemingway."

Your Editor, astonished by all this, would like to find just one camera, capable of taking good pictures despite a trembling hand and an eye blind to good composition.

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
