MISCELLANY AND/OR TECHNIQUES


Slides which are presented for club, council or other competition must be prepared as described below. For one thing, if they are marked properly the operator of the projector is able to project your slides as you intend.


Slides must be thumb-spotted on the lower left-hand corner as normally viewed, in other words, as you want it to appear on the screen. Inasmuch as slides are handled, while

being projected, in extremely dim light, it is important that the spot be clearly legible - preferably a black circle about 4 inch in diameter.

The only other marking on the front of the slide should be a title. Self-stick labels for both the thumb-spot and the title are available in camera stores and stationery stores.

On the back of the slide should be the maker's name, the club designation, and any other information.
