They were an informative store that published a newsletter, "Photophax," mailed at no charge to thousands of area photographers. They were truly dedicated to service for the hobbyist and the professional. Fullers had their own gallery where they featured works of local origin, as well as out-of-town photographers from around the nation and the world. Fuller & d'Albert were truly promoters of the fine art of photography.

BIOGRAPHIES ON REVERSE ALONG WITH FUTURE COURSES AND REGISTRATION

### SUMMARY:

PICS follows its series of formal courses in advanced photographic topics with a series of 4 PHOTOGRAPHIC WORKSHOPS and an all-day critique session to review your photos from the workshops. It will provide a unique opportunity for a one-on-one experience with nationally known working professional photographers. The general theme will be how to approach the task of photographing a picturesque location from the macroscopic detail to the overall scenic, as if it were a magazine article or for personal satisfaction.

The critique session is essential to determine how each photographer approached the task compared to others. It will be divided into 1½ hour sessions for each set of workshop results. Your effort will be evaluated in terms of potential acceptance by a magazine editor or for individual photos.

A set of instructions will be mailed to each registrant prior to the course. A picnic lunch is recommended. May 7 will be a rain date. Car pools will be arranged from the assembly areas.

### OUTLINE:

- 1) C&O CANAL AREA Assemble at 10 AM at Great Falls on the Maryland side. There will be a general discussion of the possible subjects; people, cyclists, canoeing on the canal, macrophotography of plants, plus the wide variety of possible scenics. Individual and group photos until about 4 PM.
- 2) ST. MICHAELS, MD. (Eastern shore) Assemble in the Landover Mall area (I-495, Exit 32). This workshop will be organized as if it were a magazine assignment to do a picture story of the St. Michael area. Since Jim Johnson is well known for his superb Black and White work, special emphasis will be placed on B&W as well as color photography. Return about 6 PM.
- 3) GEORGETOWN AREA Assemble at Wisconsin Avenue and K Street under the Whitehurst Freeway for urban street shooting. On numerous National Geographic assignments around the world, Dean Conger has developed his technique for capturing people candidly in everyday life. He will aid each attendee toward new ways of viewing familiar objects. From 10 AM to about 4 PM.
- 4) HARPERS FERRY Assemble at 9 AM at the Montgomery Mall area. This one day workshop will treat Historic Harpers Ferry as a magazine type assignment. Planning will include the various areas of coverage emphasizing people, restored structures, and scenery. Return 5-6 PM.
- 5) GENERAL CRITIQUE at the Ramada Inn 9:15 AM. General critique of submissions from all attendees over four 11/2 periods in the above order. Discussion of editing and marketability.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The SSCC Executive Board has decided to explore the possibility of obtaining third class, non-profit organization mailing privileges which would enable us to mail the Cable Release at a rate of two cents per piece. To qualify for such privileges, the Club would have to show a number of things, including (1) that it is organized and operated primarily for educational purposes, (2) that no substantial part of the activities of the Club consists of lobbying activities, and (3) that no part of the net earnings of the Club are distributable to the members, The following amendment to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Club has been drafted, following IRS-suggested language, to meet the second and third requirements:

No part of the net earnings of the Silver Spring Camera Club shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, officers, or other private persons, except that the Club shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the Objective and Purposes set forth in Article 4 hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Club shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Club shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, the Club shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by an organization exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by an organization, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

Upon the dissolution of the Club, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Club, dispose of all of the assets of the Club exclusively for the purposes of the Club in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Directors shall determine.

Notwithstanding such an amendment, the Club may not be able to qualify as an exempt organization entitled to cheaper mailing if it cannot demonstrate that it is organized and operated exclusively for educational purposes. Post Office regulations expressly exclude "social and hobby clubs."

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMMENDMENT

Proposed Article 17 of the SSCC Constitution and By-Laws appears in this Cable Release. The basic need to be satisfied by Article 17 would be to make a formal statement as to distribution of assets in the event of dissolution of the Club. This is legally required if SSCC is to satisfy IRS requirements for tax exempt/non-profit status.

A 2/3 vote is required for such ammendment. A ballot, which MUST be used, appears below. Ballots must be received at the Club PO box prior to April 21, 1977, or delivered in person to Mike Stein by the close of the meeting on that date. Members not submitting ballots will be presumed to be transferring their vote to the Executive Board, which will count the ballots at the May 14, 1977 Board meeting.

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
