

THE INTERNATIONAL CAMERA CLUB

The International Club is one of the closed clubs in the Washington area. It is made up only of employees of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank. Obviously, it is a very cosmopolitan group, since the members come from so many parts of the world and travel often on business.

Their president this year is Sven Cronquist from Sweden. Peter Nelson, who maintains the speakers list so well for the GWCCC, is British. Gladys Mott, a founding member, is American, and with her husband Jack, is widely known for their programs. The group's last year's president, Carole DeVillers, from France, recently took off for the Upper Volta region with a back pack and camera to photograph people. When last heard from she was in Abidjan in West Africa, alive and well and click ing away with hopes of doing a book. Hopefully she will return soon and share her work from this trip with everyone who is interested.

Visitors are welcome at this club, but since it meets in a security area, you must contact a member or someone on the GWCCC to be admitted. The group meets once a month at 6:00pm right after work in the International Monetary Fund building on 19th Street, N.W. At another time once a month they also have a Kodak or other filmed program which they show twice at noon. Like many downtown clubs, they had trouble getting their members to return in the evening, so this is their sol-ution. There are 100 members and their monthly competitions are divided into three classes, B, A and AA. An especially noteworthy event is their Spring exhibition. There is a juried show of their work in the lobby of the World Bank building with appropriate festivities. Most of the entries are in slides but are exhibited as prints. A catelogue is printed and distributed to guests at the opening. It is known as a splendid occasion. The Cable Release editor will publish the dates for this interesting event when they are available.

COLOR SLIDE CRITIQUE

At the October color slide critique meeting hosted by Anne Lewis, Garry Kreizman, our president, held a mini-workshop on slide remounting. With a few basic materials, Garry demonstrated how simple it can be to mount your precious transparencies in glass, for protection, as well as to enhance the slide by cropping, or "sandwiching," etc.

Prior to removing the slide from its original casing, the most suitable mask can be determined by using a mask selector, available from Erie Color Slide Club Inc., who also furnish masks in various sizes. After discarding the original mount, the slide can then be positioned into the selected mask and held in place with a tiny piece of tape. A light box and magnifier can be useful for this process. To make sure there are no dust particles, the slide must be cleaned with a blower (Garry used an ear syringe most effectively). Then two pieces of very thin cover glass are placed on both sides of the newly-mounted slide and held together with a clothespin. Last, hold the glass covered slide perpendicular to a small piece of film binding tape and fold the tape upward on both sides to encase the slide-cut off the excess and repeat on three sides. Walla! That's all there is to it.

To "sandwich" two slides or create a montage for special effects, use the same procedure, holding the two transparencies emulsion to emulsion and be extra careful to remove all dust particles.

Garry's expertise in critiquing the slides was most helpful, evidenced in some of the winners at the November slide meeting.

*As defined by the GWCCC rules: "Photography that utilizes contemporary manipulations to achieve a far out look. This includes the various techniques of bas relief, diazo transfers, tone separation, color pasteurization, shadow masks, solarization, sabateur effect, etc. The presence of a manipulation is subtle as to make the viewer unaware that it has taken place. Slides such as that should be considered pictorial. Duplicates which improve the picture without it being obvious that it is a duplicate is considered pictorial and not experimental. A duplicate that changes color balance to an unnatural and obvious hue is experimental. Montages, double exposures, cross screen lights, mirage images and other such effects which are immediately obvious belong to the experimental category."



SILVER SPRING CAMERA CLUB - RULES FOR COMPETITIONS AND AWARDS

GENERAL

 A competition is defined as a judging of photographs of a particular category by entrants competing in a particular class.

Entrants must be members in good standing of SSCC (current dues paid).
 Members from the prior year shall be considered paid up through the end
 of October at the start of a club year.

 There must be a minimum of three competitors entering at least nine prints or nine slides, as applicable, to conduct a competition.

4. Entries in SSCC competitions must not have been entered against SSCC in the past and may not be entered against SSCC in the future in any interclub competition.

5. Prior to competition, the title of each entry and the entrant's name must be registered in the proper log book as maintained by the Secretary.

6. The Program Chairman shall disqualify and remove any entry not conforming to the rules.

7. The judge(s) shall reject any entry not conforming to an announced subject and/or technique category. It is the duty of the Program Chairman to instruct the judge(s) in the definition of such a category. CATEGORIES

 There shall be three categories of competitions: Monochrome Prints, Color Prints, and Slides.

2. Entries in all categories must have been photographed by the entrant.

3. All processing steps, from original exposure through retouching of the entry, must have been done by Monochrome Print entrants.

4. All processing steps, from original exposure through retouching of the entry, must have been done by Color Print entrants, except that original film processing and/or internegative production need only be done under the direction of the entrant.

5. Steps in the production of a Slide entry beyond original exposure must be done by the entrant or under his direction.

6. Print category entries may not be mounted on boards exceeding 16" x 20"; the title may be on the face or the back; the entrant's name must be on the back; there shall be no hooks or protruding objects on the mount; the top of the mount shall be clearly indicated on the back.

7. Slides must be in 2" x 2" mounts suitable for projection in the Club's projector; they shall be labled with the title and the entrant's name; they shall be marked with a clearly visible and distinct thumb spot located in the lower left corner of the side of the mount facing the viewer when the hand-held slide is viewed in correct orientation.

CLASSES

1. There shall be three classes of Monochrome Print competition: Novice, Intermediate and Advanced; there shall be one open class of Color Print competition; there shall be two classes of Slide competition: Novice and Advanced.

A member's class standing in one category has no bearing on that member's standing in any other category.

3. A member may begin competing in any class of a category, and may move to the next higher class at any time. A member who has entered in a particular class may not thereafter enter in a lower class, except that members competing in Advanced Monochrome Prints as of June, 1975, may elect to enter the Intermediate Monochrome Print Class begining September, 1975. When a lower class does not have sufficient entries to have a competition, the member may enter a higher class without affecting his status in the lower class. He may re-enter the lower class on his next competition opportunity; any points won will be tallied in the lower class.

4. Novice print entries may not be larger than 8"x10"; Intermediate print entries may not be larger than 11"x14"; Advanced print entries may not be larger than 16"x20"

5. Point scores will be kept by the Secretary. A Novice or Intermediate entrant who has accumulated 18 points, over any time period, in SSCC competitions, must move to the next higher class.

MONTHLY COMPTETITIONS

1. A Slide competition will be held each month, September through May, during the regular SSCC meeting on the first Thursday of that month.

 A Monochrome Print competition will be held each month, September throgh May, during the regular SSCC meeting on the third Thursday of that month.

 Color Print competitions will be held on a schedule to be announced in the September <u>Cable Release</u> for the ensuing nine months; there will be a minimum of four competitions announced.

4. Each entrant may enter a maximum of three entries in a competition. If a member acts as judge in a competition, he may not enter that competition; however, he shall be allowed double the normal allowable entries in the next occurring competition of the same class/category.

 No entry which has won an award in an SSCC monthly competition may be re-entered. No entry may be entered in more than two monthly competitions.

6. There will be a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place, scoring 6, 4, and 2 points respectively, in each competition. There will also be a variable number of Honorable Mentions at 1 point each; the number will be equal to 10% of the competition entries, rounded up from odd multiples of 5.

7. The Executive Board may assign not more than one-half of the monthly competitions to a defined subject and/or technique. Such restricted competitions shall be scheduled and defined in the September Cable Re-

lease for the ensuing nine months.

YEAR-END COMPETITIONS

 Each member may enter a maximum of five entries per category in the year-end competition.

Year-end competitions have the same rules as monthly competitions with

respect to categories and classes.

3. Entries in year-end competitions must have been entered in a monthly competition or as an SSCC entry in an interclub competition during the preceeding nine months.

. No points will be considered or awarded.

5. A member who has entered in more than one class of a category during the preceding year may elect which class to enter for the year-end competition; however, he may only submit entries previously entered in the chosen class.

6. Awards will be distributed on the following basis: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 7 HM's.

PHOTOGRAPHER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

 For each competition category/class a Photographer of the Year award shall be given at the year-end banquet.

The awards shall be determined on the basis of points earned during the preceeding year.

3. Point totals shall be calculated as follows: SSCC monthly competition points for each particular class; plus all points earned in the next higher class of the same category; plus \(\frac{1}{2} \) of all points earned in the next lower class of the same category; plus all points earned as an SSCC entrant in GWCCC and/or All-Maryland Council competitions in equivalent categories, any class, as follows: 1st= 7, 2nd= 5, 3rd= 3, HM= 2, and acceptances= 1 point (for All-Maryland competitions, an "acceptance" will be considered earned for all entries submitted by SSCC to the Spring All-Maryland interclub competition).

A service award may be awarded to the SSCC member who the Executive Board determines has done the most during the current year to further the interests of the Club and its membership. The Executive Board shall make this determination by secret ballot, no earlier than May 1st of the award year. The awardee must receive a majority of the votes cast; if no majority is reached there may be up to two additional ballots in an effort to achieve one; if no majority is reached after the third ballot there shall be no award for that year.
