frared for color slides. Both color and B&W films are sensitive to infrared radiation just beyond the visible spectrum, but they are also sensitive to visible light so filtration is necessary for their full effect. This also means that unless you are using an 87C filter with B&W infrared you should compomise between the normal and infrared ("R") focus marks on your lens. Focus normally, note the exact distance opposite the normal focus mark, then shift the focus halfway to the infrared mark. Use a small enough f/ stop to insure that both the normal and infrared marks are within your depth of field range.

B&W infrared film has a nice ethereal quality; it's not exactly fine grain, but the grain structure is crisp and enhances its effect. A medium red, Wratten 25, filter is best for general use, but you can special order a Wratten 87C to go all the way. The 87C only transmits infrared, so it's visibly opaque -- that presents some interesting challenges for SLR users. With a red filter, healthy green follage comes out white, blue sky is almost black, clouds are chalky white, and white skin and many flowers have an almost translucent quality. Exposure is a bit of a challenge since meters are not infrared sensitive and the visible to infrared ratio in daylight is not constant; also, distant scenes get shorter exposures than close range shots. Just follow Kodak's guidelines packed with the film and bracket! Be warned that Kodak's comment to load and unload your camera in darkness is for real, the felt trap on the cassette is not infrared proof and the film will be fogged if the cassette is out of the film can or camera even in deep shade (carry some equivalent of a changing bag!)

Darkroom processing is fairly standard and the data sheet has times and temps for developers like D-76.

Ektachrome Infrared is a rather dif ferent animal; it has very good con trast, saturation and grain structu It is, however, with Kodak's reccom mended Wratten 12 filter, a "false color" film. That is, some intention al color shifts are built in. For example: blue sky is blue, healthy deciduous foliage (infrared reflective) is magenta, sick foliage is green, some black textile dyes (infrared absorbers) are red, and skin is wierd. You can get the Wratten 1 filter in a gelatine square (cut to fit behind a 1A or UV filter or retaining ring), or a deep yellow or orange filter is fairly close. Try other filters for a variety of effects. As with B&W infrared, follow Kodak's exposure reccommendations as bracket. Most labs can process Ektachrome Infrared with no problem, you can even send it to Choke Cherry Ros in a PK mailer.


One last note, infrared films are more sensitive to heat damage than other films; the camera store that sells it to you should have it refrigerated.
