



This should be one night you won't want to miss. Again, guests are welcome.



On Motivation and Purpose ...

Recently, on my second viewing of "American Images" -- the Bell System funded exhibit which closed at the Corcoran December 2, my reactions to the images on the walls caused me to pay some extra attention to the commentaries next to each photographers work. If you missed this show you missed an important photographic event; if you also missed seeing "Mirrors and Windows" (November field trip) I am truly sad. The point is that these two exhibits represent much of what contemporary photography is all about,

There is little doubt that any exposure to contemporary works will evoke a mixed bag of emotions -fantastic! to garbage! Despite this I feel it is important to our photographic and artistic growth to try to get in touch with or at least try to understand what is happening beyond the sometimes inbred salon mentality of camera club and council competitions. This is not to knock the club approach, it is an invaluable learning vehicle, but there is something to what museum curators and the like find exciting and fresh.

Getting back to those photographer's commentaries -- they ranged from provoking insight to inane. I jotted down what I thought was the essence of each photographer's motivation or purpose. The jist of each is listed below. If for no other objective, I hope they at least cause some personal reflection on your own photography.

Bevan Davies -- examine a style taken for granted because of its uniqueness and beauty

Jonathan Green -- see light that reveals -- photos are a vocabulary of tone, continuity, syntax and breadth of color

Larry Fink -- achieve sensual empathy, involvement with people

Linda Connor -- seeks essence, the apparition of a form or idea, not

temporal situations Jan Groover -- content is not relavant, formalism is everything John Gossage -- no comment William Eggleston -- his pictures were about the 'idea' of landscape, a sense of location Robert Adams -- a rediscovery of what impressed our forbearers Harry Callahan -- said he always seemed to photograph the same subjects, but always need to see them freshly, to feel intensely about them again, or your work becomes dull and decorative Ted Papageorge -- aims at the difference between preconceptions of a place and what it turns out to be Richard Misrach--look at enough' examples of apparent chaos and order eventually emerges, becomes internalized, and starts to reshape your patterns of visual perception Elliot Frwitt--I am just an observer Frank Gohlke -- the power of a picture often derives from a form that exists in memory Roy DeCarva -- making a good photograph is a matter of keying one's feelings to a situation and bringing both together in an image William Clift -- wanted his feelings to be communicated immediately Stephen Shore -- wanted to document MaryEllen Mark--prints were part of a documentary project Nicholas Nixon -- the picture is the point, the cleverer and more beautiful the better Lewis Baltz -- no comment Joel Meyerowitz -- .seeing counterpoints is the thing

Those attending the sessions are requested to bring 6 good slides to the meetings. We then have a showing and everyone is invited to praise or give any constructive suggestion as to how the slide could be improved from a competitive viewpoint. Usually, we have enough 'experts' in attendance as well as the 'novices' to guide us in our thinking.

In addition, this year we are inviting members to bring any slides that are indicative of a particular problem that the member may be having. Hopefully, somebody in the group can pinpoint the trouble.

We usually have a speaker dealing with a particular subject-such as the very fine lecture given by Leon Rothenberg at the October meeting on "Travel Photography". Emerson Gray is giving us the benefit of his wisdom at the November meeting on a subject that he keeping a secret. However, we know from the past that Emerson always comes through like a pro.

Leonard Tuchin will discuss the use of "Filters With Color Film"at our January meeting. We are all familiar with his very fine work that we have seen in the club competitions-so we can expect a very interesting talk from him.

We hope to deal with the subject of "Macrophotography" at a future meeting.

The Ritz Camera store on 1701 Pennsylvania Ave, NW has a special one hour rush service on 35mm and 110 color print film. Here are the details:

A roll of ASA 100 color print film will be developed and printed in ONE hour at these prices- 24 exp; \$10.99; 36 exp; \$14.59. A roll of ASA 400 color print film or Vericolor will cost \$11.44 for 24 exp. and \$15.04 for 36 for this one hour service. Their regular seven hour service for color print film costs two dollars less per roll.

Though this store is open Monday through Friday 9-6pm and Saturday 9:30-5pm, their processing machine is in operation from 9-2:30 pm Monday through Friday. Call Ritz at 466-3470 for further details.


Our next field trip will be sometime in January, hopefully indoors at one of the area's processing labs.
