Structure and Knowledge Will Not Hurt

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(a letter to the editor)

Something needs to be corrected. We need officers and committee chairpeople who read and understand the rules of competition, the constitution and the by-laws of the club. On who else are the members going to rely?

While nothing serious has happened, in the sense that the club seems to be chugging along no matter what, I for one take seriously what the club has written in order to conduct its business. Club officials who, for whatever reason, pay little attention to these documents, fake it, or want to expedite matters, are an affront to the work and the contributions of past members. An example occurred when the nominating committee chairperson announced the Board's slate of officers and closed the nominations by requesting a seconding motion from the floor. The process was repeated at the next meeting with an additional SSCC first - election by acclamation. The committee chairperson

literally confused the method of voting, and someone came to the rescue with a suggested acclamation vote.

The constitution does not require seconding and implies that nominations are not closed until the moment before elections are held.

There are many other examples regarding incorrect competition rule pronouncements, holding a board meeting without a proper quorum, and so on.

The club normally conducts its business with as little formality as possible, which I think is good. It makes SSCC what it is. However, I think it has gotten out of hand. We must have informed officials in the regular meetings and in the Board meetings to put things back on track.

AMHERST JULY 8, 9 and 10, 1983

Ever see forty or fifty photographers all shooting the same subject at the same time, and it was not a field trip? If you did, chances are that you've been to Amherst!

For those of you who haven't been, but who've heard mention of this quiet New England college town; Amherst is the site of the annual Summer seminar presented by the New England Council of Camera Clubs. It is an educational extravaganza of sizeable proportions! The seminar itself, or more accurately - seminars, are as widely varied as the attendees. From the very basics to the hairiest of darkroom manipulations. There is something of interest for all, plus infectious enthusiasm!

Classes cover such subjects as travel, insect, bird, photojournalism and portrait photography. There are sessions on color and black & white printing, both basic and advanced techniques. In addition, there are special events. Last year there was a showing of something called "Tangerine Dream, which is beyond description. There are also models and still-life set-ups.

The stay at Amherst is CHEAP and extremely enjoyable, but BE WARNED ... IT IS HOT! Take a fan, if you are staying in the dorms. You'd think New England is cool in the Summer, but it isn't!! Oh yes, one other thing, make sure you travel with companions willing to eat "on the road." Otherwise, ask Alan Lisook where to dine, he knows all the great spots in southern Jersey!

This question has arisen several times this past club year, and there are still some who believe it to be a good idea. Having just had my ego dashed to bits on the rocks of the Year End Competition, I have a few thoughts pertinent to the question.

I was catapulted into the Advanced class after a very brief stay in Intermediate; however, I do not believe that my work is on a level with the Advanced workers. Our system, unfortunately, does not provide any options in this regard. When you obtain 18 points, you advance to the next class! While it is not impossible to win against the really Advanced folks, nor is it impossible to win with 11 X 14's competing against the 16 X 20's, but it is VERY difficult AND discouraging! I, personally, disagree with those who argue that the challenge results in greater effort and/or more diligence leading to a better finished product. I believe that this comes with time, experience and encouragement. In other words, I believe this to be an acquired proficiency.

Therefore, I believe there to be a definite place for the Intermediate class. If there are insufficient entries for competitive purposes, the cause is threefold; 1) there is a limited number of new members each year with a correspondingly limited number of new Novice workers, 2) those Intermediates who are in the club may not be entering all competitions to the extent permitted, and 3) advancement out of the Novice and Intermediate classes is too rapid due to the first factor. Consider the points gained from a small competition. We require a minimum of nine works to hold a competition, this can be as few as three members. Using our formula of 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 10% HM, this competition will result in 44% of the entries receiving some points. Compare this with the 20% receiving points for the average Advanced class competition of 45 prints!

I do not believe that the paucity of Intermediate prints should be dealt with by eliminating what I see as a highly desirable class. I think that our mandatory advancement criteria should be changed until and unless we have a large enough influx of Novice and/or Intermediate workers to provide for genuine, adequate and reasonable advancement to make the 18 point level realistic and viable.

This question has been discussed to death at numerous Board meetings, but no resolution has been forthcoming.

I am hoping that this article will stimulate thought and discussion amongst our membership, particularly those who would be affected by either a change in the advancement criteria or elimination of the Intermediate class.

If you have thoughts or comments on this subject, please submit them to me for publication in the Cable Release scheduled for September, 1983. Additionally, bring your comments and opinions to a Board meeting where action can be taken to correct the problem.
