SILVER SPRING CAMERA CLUB COMPETITIONS, OR What is it all about?

Again, welcome to those of you who are need to follow to enter our monthly competitions.

First of all, we have two intra-club competitions every month. During the first meeting of the month, you may enter 2 slides which will be judged against those of other club members. Since we have two slide classes, novice and advanced, you may enter your slides in either. However, once you enter as advanced, you may not retreat to novice at a later time. If a competition does not have a designated category or subject, you may enter any slides you wish. If a subject or category has been assigned to a particular competition, your entries must conform.

In order to actually enter your slides, you must do the following:

1- Place your name, the class in which you are entering (nov or adv will do) and your title for the slide, on the side of the slide which is opposite from the way it is viewed. For now, we will call this the back of the slide. On the front you must put a mark in the lower left hand corner. as the slide is to be viewed. This is for correct placement in the projector and rightside up, correct left-to-right viewing.

2- Upon entering our meeting place, you will see our record books out on a table. You must record the titles of your entries and your name in the correct class book.

3- Place your slides into the appropriate piles. It is suggested that you separate your works, especially if they are at all similar.

That's it, you are on your way to ribbons and recognition. Lots of luck!

Our second monthly meeting is the time for our photographic printers to "shine in the dark."

Each print meeting will feature a monochrome (i.e. usually black and white) competition, and at least one color competition. You are invited to enter up to three prints in both new to our club. This article is intended categories. Once again, there are classes to give you an idea of the procedures you depending upon your expertise and advancement within the club. In monochrome, there are three classes; novice, intermediate and advanced. As in slide competitions, you may start competing in any class; however, once you compete in any given level, you may not return to a "lower" class. Another similarity with our slide competitions is the occassional assignment of categories or subjects for a particular month. For example, a competition may be deemed to be "architecture," in which case you may only enter photos meeting the definition for this subject.

> While we generally follow the subject and categories of the Greater Washington Council of Camera Clubs (the GWCCC), there may be departures. Definitions will be published in the Cable Release before any competition so assigned. In addition, this issue of the Cable Release has a list of assigned subjects for this club year, including our definitions.

> Your prints must have the following information on the back of each entry; your name, the class in which you are entering (nov, int, or adv will suffice) and a title for the work should appear in the upper left hand corner. You must also clearly mark the top of each print on the back. No writing may appear on the front of the print. No framed prints are permitted.

> Unlike our slide competitions, in which all processing may have been done commercially, your prints must have been produced by the entrant personally (the negative or transparency may have been commercially processed).

This issue of the Cable Release has a general description of our rules of competition and club point structure. After reading these, if you have any questions, please call one of our officers - they will be happy to help.

Finally, don't feel shy about entering your works. Even if September is your first meeting at any camera club. Your works are at least as good as many others, and you may just bring home a ribbon. What better way to start the club year?!

SILVER SPRING CAMERA CLUB - RULES FOR COMPETITIONS

GENERAL

- A competition is defined as a judging of photographs of a particular category by entrants competing in a particular class.
- Entrants must be members in good standing of SSCC (current dues paid). Members from the prior year shall be considered paid up through the end of October at the start of a club year.
- There must be a minimum of three competitors entering at least nine prints or nine slides, as applicable, to conduct a competition.
- 4. Entries in SSCC competitions must not have been entered against SSCC in the past and may not be entered against SSCC in the future in any inter-club competition.
- Prior to competition, the title of each entry and the entrant's name must be registered in the proper log book as maintained by the Secretary.
- The program chairman shall disqualify and remove any entry not conforming to the rules.
- 7. The judge(s) shall reject any entry not confirming to an announced subject and/or technique category. It is the duty of the Program Chairman to instruct the judge(s) in the definition of such a category.

CATEGORIES

- There shall be three categories of competitions: Monochrowe Prints, Color Prints, and Slides.
- 2. Entries in all categories must have been photographed by the entrant.
- All processing steps, from original exposure through retouching of the entry, must have been done by Monochrome Print entrants.
- 4. All processing steps, from original exposure through retouching of the entry, must have been done by Color Print entrants, except that original film processing and/or internegative production need only be done under the direction of the entrant.
- Steps in the production of a Slide entry beyond original exposure must by done by the entrant or under his direction.
- 6. Print category entries may not be mounted on boards exceeding 16" x 20"; the title may be on the face or the back; the entrant's name must be on the back; there shall be no hooks or protruding objects on the mount; the top of the mount shall be clearly indicated on the back.
- 7. Slides must be in 2" x2" mounts suitable for projection in the Club's projector; they shall be labled with the title and the entrant's name; they shall be marked with a clearly visible and distinct thumb spot located in the lower left hand corner of the side of the mount facing the viewer when the hand-held slide is viewed in correct orientation.

CLASSES

- There shall be three classes of Monochrome Print competition: Novice, Intermediate and Advanced; there shall be one open class of Color Print competition; there shall be two classes of Slide competition: Novice and Advanced.
- A member's class standing in one category has no bearing on that member's standing in any other category.

CLASSES (Cont'd.)

- 3. A member may begin competing in any class of a category, and may move to the next higher class at any time. A member who has entered in a particular class may not thereafter enter in a lower class, except that members competing in Advanced Monochrome Prints as of June, 1975, may elect to enter the Intermediate Monochrome Print Class beginning September, 1975. When a lower class does not have sufficient entries to have a competition, the member may enter a higher class without affecting his status in the lower class. He may re-enter the lower class on his next competition opportunity; any points will be tallied in the lower class.
- 4. Novice entries may not be larger than 8" x 10"; Intermediate print entries may not be larger than 11"x14"; Advanced print entries may not be larger than 16"x20".
- Point scores will be kept by the Secretary. A novice or Intermediate entrant who
 has accumulated 18 points, over any time period, in SSCC competitions, must move
 to the next higher class.

MONTHLY COMPETITIONS

- A Slide competition will be held each month, September through May, during the regular SSCC meeting on the first Thursday of that month.
- A Monochrome Print competition will be held each month, September through May, during the regular SSCC meeting on the third Thursday of that month.
- Color Print competitions will be held on a schedule to be announced in the September <u>Cable Release</u> for the ensuing nine months; there will be a minimum of four competitions announced.
- 4. Each entrant may enter a maximum of three entries in a competition, If a member acts as judge in a competition, he may not enter that competition; however, he shall be allowed double the normal allowable entries in the next occurring competition of the same class/category.
- No entry which has won an award in an SSCC monthly competition may be re-entered.No entry may be entered in more than two monthly competitions.
- 6. There will be a lst, 2nd, and 3rd place, scoring 6, 4, and 2 points respectively, in each competition. There will also be a variable number of Honorable Mentions at 1 point each; the number will be equal to 10% of the competition entries, rounded up from odd multiples of 5.
- 7. The Executive Board may assign not more than one-half of the monthly competitions to a defined subject and/or technique. Such restricted competitions shall be scheduled and defined in the September <u>Cable Release</u> for the ensuing nine months.

YEAR-END COMPETITIONS

- Each member may enter a maximum of five entries per category in the year-end competition.
- Year-end competitions have the same rules as monthly competitions with respect to categories and classes.
- Entries in year-end competitions must have been entered in a monthly competition or as a SSCC entry in an interclub competition during the preceding nine months.
- 4. No points will be considered or awarded.
- 5. A member who has entered in more than one class of a category during the precaeding year may elect which class to enter for the year-end competition; however, he may only submit entries previously entered in the chosen class.
- 6. Awards will be distributed on the following basis: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5 HM's.

One of New York City's subways? No! An alien from a far-away world? No! RT is a company located in Gaithersburg which produces color chemistries suitable for the home darkroom. The initials stand for "Room Temperature," for that is one important characteristic of these products.

Many of you will recall the print meeting, last year, at which Mr. Bender and Mr. Edwards - both of RT - gave us a demonstration of the firm's negative color printing chemistry. It looked good when they did it.

The question is, will it work as well when you or I use the stuff? At that meeting, these gentlemen were kind enough to offer club members a healthy discount on their products. I figured I would give it a try. Here's my report:

I am relatively new to printing from color negatives; although I have had considerable experience with printing from slides, this is a vastly different world! Since my old darkroom hovered around 55°F in the winter, it is very important to me to use a system which does not require very high temps, say over 85°F. I tried the Parcolor chemistry system, and was fairly satisfied with the results. Since expense is an important consideration, in addition to temperature, I was somewhat limited in choices. I was, therefore, happy to try the RT Chemistry, which costs around a dollar to process a 16 X 20 (depending on how closely you adhere to the firm's replenishment instructions - more on this later).

I feel that my FIRST results were nothing short of spectacular! Using Ektacolor 78 paper (which is slightly higher in contrast than the 74 paper), I got excellent color rendering, and saturation. In addition, my whites were pristine clean. Of course, this is all predicated on my good fortune to have hit the filtration right! However, it is also a function of the chemistry, particularly the saturation and "cleanness." While I did have a slight magenta cast to the borders of my first few prints, that vanished with the use of an acid stop.

Which brings me to another highly valuable point about this company...RT is not only accessable, being in the area, but the two photographers who run it are sincerely

interested in your success with their products; contrast this attitude to that of a firm like Beseler, which doesn't seem to care at all after your purchase!

In fact, I phoned the firm about the magenta cast, at which time several suggestions were made to determine the cause and the remedy. Many companies will do this much for you! However, when I switched from 8 X 10s to do my very first 16 X 20 color negative print, I "developed" a "stain" on the first two tries. Since my equipment was brand new, and since I was also using an unfamiliar chemistry. I had no idea where to start looking for the problem. Lisook suggested that it might be due to insufficient solution volume, while I thought it may have been caused by the way the vertical fill end caps empty onto the paper. Two very different ideas! I certainly did not want to waste more 16 X 20 paper until I found the problem and rectified it.

So I called RT and spoke to Ken Edwards. He invited me to his home so that he could examine the prints. My visit resulted in his deduction of the cause of the "stain," which turned out to be 100% correct - and easily remedied (it was a light-leak in my enlarger head). How many companies will do this much for you?

Drawbacks to the system? Yes, there are a few. Back in the left-hand column, I alluded to one of them. In order to get your money's worth, you must replenish the RT chemistry. The instructions call for the discard of 18ml out of 90 used to do one 8 X 10, with replenishment of the 18 by fresh chemistry. This means that you must save the stuff when you drain your drum. This is quite different from other processes where you dump into the sink or into a bucket. Another drawback is the fact that this is not an all-liquid chemistry. It requires mixing and dissolution. Finally, unlike Parcolor, you must mix a whole liter at one time. However, none of these are fatal drawbacks, in my opinion. It does take some getting used to to save the stuff upon draining, but it's no big deal, especially if you use large measuring cups. The mixing and dissolution is done at very reasonable temperatures and is quick and complete. Lastly, the mixed chemistry appears to have a fairly good shelf life, even in partially filled containers.

Macro/Micro Photography

If you look at the list, on page 2 of this issue of the Cable Release, of assigned competition subjects for this club year, you will see Macro/Micro assigned for both slide and monochrome competitions in February. While SSCC generally follows the definitions employed by the Greater Washington Council of Camera Clubs (the GWCCC), an Amphoto/Nikon publication offers some interesting thoughts on this topic. The publication, which is extremely well written and useful even for those who use other brands of equipment, is entitled "Close-up Photography and Copying."

For definitions, this book suggests that "general" photography extends down to 1/10th subject size on the negative; "close-up" goes from about 1/20th to about five time magnification; "macro" photography picks up at
