If you read "Lasting Impressions" in the July WASHINGTONIAN; if you saw "A Photographer's Flash of Insight" in the June 3 POST or the book, WASHINGTON, PORTRAIT OF A CITY; or if you attended the one man photo exhibition of Gottlieb large scale enlargements at the Midtown Gallery, you'll have an idea why we were so anxious to schedule Steven Gottlieb.

You will wonder how this creator of sensitive but striking images could be the same man who was once a high-powered attorney, serving at times on Wall Street, in OMB, and in the U.S. Synthetic Fuels Corporation. He was also, and still is, a high-powered tennis player; in 1982 he ranked No. 1 in the 35-and-over age group in the Mid -Atlantic Tennis Association. In the summer of 1985 he represented the U.S. in the Maccabiah Games in Israel.

Only in seeing the Gottlieb photographs will you discover their unique quality. He does not strive for reality; he arranges, assembles, and abstracts details and patterns. "I try to capture the essence of the subject", he says. "Most photographers talk about light, texture, form. I'm trying to focus on the heart."

BREAKTHROUGH IN LARGE FORMAT DUPING OF 35MM TRANSPARENCIES

Many of us are reluctant to send out our best portfolio slides for reproduction. The danger of those slides being lost or damaged is too great. I have found a local company that has designed and built a new camera which can make a high quality repro quality duplicate in the 70mm format (2 1/4" X 3 1/3") from a 35mm original. Naturally image quality and color fidelity is of utmost importance to me, as it is to any professional. The results have been so good that I used the 70mm transparencies in preference to the original 35mm slides for producing a costly promotional brochure. Our fellow ASMP member, Steve Uzell, uses these large format duplicates for his pages in BLACK BOOK and ASMP ANNUAL. Picture editors, art directors and publishers are enthusiastic about the 70mm format since they can clearly see the image without a lupe.

The company is COMCORPS at 711 41th St., NW, Washington, DC 20001. (Phone 638-6550). This 70mm camera is the only one in existence and Eastman Kodak produced their Ektachrome duplicating stock in 70mm especially for COMCORPS. These large format duplicates cost less than \$5.00 each with an order of 50 or more at the same time. (That can be from any number of 35mm original slides.)

The 70mm transparencies are far better quality than the same transfer made to 4x5 sheet film since the thinner emulsion on the 70mm film allows for a sharper, less diffused image.

POINTS FOR CMCC ACCEPTANCE

Acceptance points -- 117 of them -- were awarded 27 members by SSCC for their submissions to the selection committee for the March 9, 1986 CMCC club competition. 
