His awards include: Grand award winner of the White House News Photographers Association, The Chicago Press Photographers Association sports award, and the First Place in the color competition for the World Photo Contest at the Hague. 

# **Competition Rules Change**

At the recent board meeting several changes in the competition rules were adopted:

- Any questions regarding year-end points must be submitted in writing to the Executive Committee within 90 days after the banquet.
- (2) The Board of Directors has re-established the Competition Committee as provided by Article XIV Section D of the by laws. Among other duties the committee will develop rules of competition and present them to the board for approval. The committee also will determine the eligibility of entries and will deal with any questions regarding entries. The Secretary will be chairperson. The committee has been selected to be:

(3) The board has decided on a rule change or addition. A penalty has been added for a rule violation. Anyone entering a photo in a category more than the allowed 3 times will penalized the equivalent of a first place which is 6 points. The first time this occurs the member will be given a warning. Any further violation will result in 6 points subtracted from any acquired point totals. Any points awarded on

attempts beyond the legal entry limit will automatically be removed. The warnings will be retroactive. That is: if you have submitted a photo more than three times in the past, you already have been "warned". This will only affect four members. This rule is to emphasize that you are responsible for keeping track of your entries.

#### **Critique Meetings**

In the fall we will start a new concept for the monthly club meetings. We have asked Eliot Cohen, one of our recent speaker/judges who earned a Masters Degree in fine arts at the Maryland Institute and currently teaches photography at the Loudoun Campus of Northern Virginia Community College to assist us along with four of our illustrious members, Henry Rosenthal, Chuck Bress, Gary Kreizman, and Mike Stein. They will assist us in developing our critique skills in order that we can better evaluate our own work. The esthetic and craft decisions made in the production of our work will be addressed.

The sessions will be more of a conversation than a presentation. Photographers of all experience levels are encouraged to attend. The discussion will focus on specific prints provided by the participants, that is all club members.

#### See You All in the Fall

The next issue of the Cable Release will come out about early August with any summer news that has come up plus the April, May, and Year-End winners. The deadline for submissions will be about the third week of July. For those of you who really do plan that far ahead here is the schedule for next year:

<u>September</u>: Competition subject will be "Nature".
<u>October</u>: Critique Meetings (covering both prints and slides — see article in this issue.)

November: Competition will be "Open".

<u>December</u>: Competition subject will be "The Quality of Light". This will be the effect of light on the environment and the effect of the environment on light. This can include animate or inanimate objects. (This has also been described as a category where the <u>light is the subject</u> rather than being secondary to the object being photographed.)

February: Competition subject will be "Industrial Photography". Mike Traynor has indicated that he will provide a little guidance on what can be done with this subject.

April: Competition Subject will be "Street Scenes".

May: First meeting will be the annual Auction. The second meeting will be a combined print and slide competition. Competition subject will be "Emotion". Show thought, concern, anticipation, anger, love, etc.

## Spiratone's Darkroom Director

Let me tell you about my darkroom timer. For one thing, it was not for sale at the club auction. That means that I like it ...

A recent issue of Darkroom Photography featured an article about various Spiratone products. For those of you unfamiliar with this firm, it is primarily a mail order company in New York which used to specialize in lenses, filters and all sorts of photographic accessories (they do have at least two New York stores, one in Manhattan and the other in Queens). They are now catering more and more to the video interests, but they have (so far) retained their photographic line. Among these products is their "Darkroom Director," an all-inone timer for around \$110 (add \$15 for their footswitch and mounting bracket at the time of purchase of the timer).

The timer functions both as an enlarging timer, with metronome signal, if you wish, and programmable timer setable to tenths of a second. It has a separate safelight outlet and will switch the safelight off for focusing and/or metering automatically for you. Press a button, and you are in the processing mode with up to nine time memories available to you. Beyond that, the "Darkroom Director" offers three programmable tone times, if you want them, and a fourth is preprogrammed to beep at 30 second intervals. In my usage, I program the timer to beep at 15 seconds (15 seconds before the end of a step) and I also program an extra tone at time's end (this makes the end tone a bit longer). These are in addition to the preprogrammed 30 second beeps.

Unlike some other timers, the "Darkroom Director" will wait for you at the end of a step. You don't

have to rush to keep up with it! It also has an "off" button which will turn off the display but retain what you have programmed. This feature has been one of the two problems I have had with mine. Mine will wipe out its memory if left "off" for an extended period. The other problem I have had also occurs when the timer is left on for a long time. It will add a "fractured" six to its digital LED display of any timed steps which are less than 3 digits (e.g. 30 seconds becomes 6:30). I never noticed this when the timer was under warranty or I would have sent it back for replacement. Spiratone is very much unlike other New York mail order houses. They genuinely stand behind their products. By now, my timer has been serving me for about 8 years, so it's kind of too late.

Incidentally, I have seen the exact same timer sold under a different brand name, probably that of its manufacturer, for nearly twice the price charged by Spiratone.

Need a timer? I recommend this one! Remember, this is my opinion and is not an endorsement by the Silver Spring Camera Club.

Enjoy your summer in the dark!
