Slide Meeting April 6th

The speaker and Judge for the April Slide meeting will be Willa Percival who has been photographing in the US and Europe since she photographed Herbert Hoover with a box camera in 1935. As a Californian, she discovered there were a few other places in the world as beautiful, but hopes to return to her native heath sometime in the 90's (1990's that is).

On one of her trips with cameras she photographed British schools, on another, Maltese goats, on another Greek and Turkish fisherman. Her chief love, however, has been the streets of New York, where she worked for more than ten years in publishing and wrote features for Infinity (ASMP house organ), Modern Photography, and other magazines about photogra-phers such as Imogen Cunningham, Weegee, Lartigue, de Beausacq, and Penn. On one assignment to meet a French fashion photographer at the Hotel Pierre, his butler asked her to join him for croissants or

brioche in the salle de bains. (He never got out of the tub until noon.)

She worked under Herbert Keppler and with Arthur Goldsmith as an instructor at the Famous Photographers School in Westport, Connecticut before coming to the DC area where she has taught at Sandy Spring Friends School and in DC Arts in Action programs in the District.

Under auspices of the International Photography Society she organized and curated a show of Chinese landscapes entitled CHINA FROM WITHIN which later

toured the US for three years.

While writing has always been an important adjunct of her life, she still adheres to the rather time-worn adage that one picture is worth a thousand words.

Talking about images somehow often seems to intrude on the substance or the emotion inherent or evoked by the image. Nonetheless, words have a way of spin-ning themselves out, and she looks for-ward to viewing the works presented with something more than wordless enjoyment of them.

Mike Traynor Recipient of the Carl E. Emory Award

On March 19th, 1989 the Council of Maryland Camera Clubs presented its Carl E. Emory Award to Mike Traynor. This award is given from time to time (not every year) as recognition of individuals who have contributed significantly to the furtherance of the art, science, and study of photography through:

1. Assistance to amateurs and clubs in their organization, activities, and photo-

2. Ability to present programs related to photography and of interest to those who are concerned with the advancement of the photographic arts;

3. Availability to camera clubs for judging and critical evaluation; and,

4. Provision of information concerning photography (including workshops and other teaching formats) for amateurs.

Eligible recipients may include professional photographers and artists who need not be members of a CMCC-affiliated camera club.

Spring Competition

SSCC has always been a leader in GWCCC competition. All points carned in GWCCC competition count toward most SSCC awards and here are 21 more opportunities to win! All entries must be marked according to GWCCC rules, but, if you get them to me by the April Print meeting, I'll mark them and make up your entry form. Just tell me the class and category and give me a check made out to GWCCC for \$ 0.40 per entry. (See rules last month and more in this issue.)

6 x 6 Competition

The first 2 1/4" x 2 1/4" (6 cm x 6 cm) competition went well (especially well for SSCC) but the number of entries was less than hoped for. Consensus is that this was due to poor turnout at the GWCCC meetings. Even though the information was made available last October, it simply didn't get back to all the clubs. Its been decided that this will become an ongoing event and next year's competition has been tentatively set for February 1990. See the winners of this event elsewhere in this issue.

GWCCC Rules for Entries and Categories

Classes. Where competition is separated into levels of proficiency, classes shall be as follows:

- Master. Anyone who has attained and demonstrated a high excellence in photography. Any entrant may elect this class but the following must compete in the Master Class.
- (a) A professional, defined as one who obtains 50% or more of income from photography;
- (b) Any person with "three stars" in PSA; and
- (c) Any person who has received four(4) first, second, or third place awards
- (4) first, second, or third place awards in the Advanced Class of GWCCC competition since and including 1983.
- Advanced. Anyone of moderate or high ability in photography. Anyone who has received four (4) first, second, or third place awards in the GWCCC Novice Class competitions since and including 1983 must compete in Advanced (or higher) class.
- 3. Novice. A beginner or anyone of limited experience in competition. An entrant who has received four (4) first, second, or third place awards in this class must compete in a higher class. However, a Master or Advanced competitor may enter a different entry type as a Novice if not experienced in that type (i.e. a Slide Master may be a Monochrome Print Novice).

Entry Type. Entry types shall include Monochrome Prints, Color Prints, Slides, Stereo Slides, Films, and Photo Essays. The rules for entries shall be as follows:

 Appropriate clubs or groups approved by the Executive Board shall act as agents of the Executive Board for conducting competition in Stereo Slides and Photo Essays. Entry in these competitions shall be open to all members of GWCCC affiliated clubs. Entry particulars shall be determined by the conducting organizations.

- 2. Prints must be produced by the entrant except in novice classes. Slides may be processed commercially. (Note: The SSCC Board of Directors has voted that all prints, including Novice Class prints, representing SSCC in GWCCC or other competition, shall be printed by the entrant.)
- Prints must be mounted but mounts or mats may not exceed 16 x 20 inches. A mounted print may have no more than one layer of mat overlay.
- Framed prints are not eligible for competition.
- 5. Prints submitted in the Novice Class may not exceed 11 x 14 inches. Prints submitted in other classes may be larger than 11 x 14 inches.
- A toned print may be entered only as a Monochrome Print.
- 7. A tinted print may be entered only as a Color Print.
- Slides may be mounted in cardboard, plastic, or glass mounts, provided that the mounted slide is thin enough to be useable in standard 80-slide capacity carousel trays.

Subjects. The following subject categories are applicable to GWCCC competitions. (Not all subject categories are available at all competitions.)

- Pictorial. Open. Any subject, especially subjects that do not qualify in the following subject definitions. No photograph may be excluded from the pictorial category.
- 2. Nature. Pictures that portray different kinds or various aspects of natural plant and animal life in a living state, that illustrates the natural features of land and sea, or that reveal certain natural phenomena, such as cloud formations, light reflections (sunsets, auroras, etc.), precipitation, frost, and fire, but which do not show the hand of man such as buildings, fences, beer cans, etc. Do-

mestic plants or animals may be included, provided they do not show the hand of man.

- Portraiture. People or animals, full length or close-up, including nudes and groups where the subjects, rather than the activity are the main interest.
- Photojournalism. Story-telling pictures of people doing things, where the activity itself is the theme.
- Abstract. Blends of color, texture, shape, form, and light to create a designpattern image.
- Experimental. Images that utilize camera and/or darkroom manipulations to achieve unreality.
- Architectural. Buildings, interiors, ruins, bridges, or anything where manmade structures are the principal interest.
- Close-up. Images that result from the use of close-up lenses, macro lenses, etc. where the magnification of the subject exceeds that obtained with a standard lens at minimum focusing distance.
- Still Life. Images of inanimate subjects in a static condition.

Other Conditions.

- An entry, whether it receives an award or not may be entered only twice in GWCCC competition.
- A previous competition entry which received a first, second, or third place award, or an entry of essentially the same image of the same Type, may be entered only in a higher Class.
- An identical picture may not be entered as a different type, nor may pictures similar to an entry (pictures taken at the same time from the same position, same subject and lighting) be entered in any competition.
- The entrant's Class in GWCCC competition shall be independent of the entrant's level of proficiency within the entrant's club.
- Each Club and Club's delegate shall be responsible for administering the competition rules with regard to entries by the Club members.

Sun Images

Ever try to take a photo with the sun in the background? I've tried and found it to be very frustrating because of the flare and multiple "ghost" sun images which I have thought to be unavoidable. Then the March/April 1987 issue of Darkroom Photography presented a magnificent sunset photo with no such problems.

In response to my inquiry, I received a very gracious handwritten explanation from Alfred Blaker. Incidentally, Mr Blaker has done so on numerous occasions.

For those who are not familiar with the term, "flare" is a generalized loss of contrast which can occur due to light bouncing around between the elements of a lens and within the lens and/or camera body. The ghost images are due to similar reflections within the lens, but are sufficiently coherent as to actually create an image on your negative or slide. Most modern lenses are coated to reduce or eliminate flare but a shot directly into the sun is perhaps the toughest test. furthermore, many of today's lenses, notably zoom lenses, comprise numerous individual lenses within. It is not unusual to see a zoom lens with twelve to fifteen component lens elements. Since each lens element has two surfaces, you can understand the potential for multiple reflections even with the best anti-flare coatings! Incidentally, a protective or other filter will add another two surfaces.

Mr Blaker further explained that he minimizes flare by attaching a lens hood and then places an additional rim of black photo tape to the hood while looking

through the viewfinder. By doing so, he builds a rim which eliminates all extraneous light while carefully avoiding interference with the image (he avoids "vignetting").

Mr Blaker also noted that he performs a simple test on all lenses before purchase which bears on this problem. He writes that he focuses on the sun and, while looking through the viewfinder, moves the camera around to see if he gets visible flare either directly (the ghost images) or by internal reflection (which is the general loss of contrast discussed above, and which can actually be observed depending on its

severity). He says that he will not buy a lens which produces this effect. While he didn't say so, I am certain that he does not look directly at the sun through the viewfinder as this can cause permanent eye damage!

I am very grateful to Mr. Blaker for his several personal responses to my inquiries. Incidentally, I find Darkroom Photography to be a superb publication for those of you who are mushrooms like me (we thrive in the dark). Their whole staff has always been very responsive to reader inquiries.

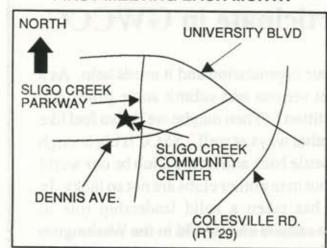

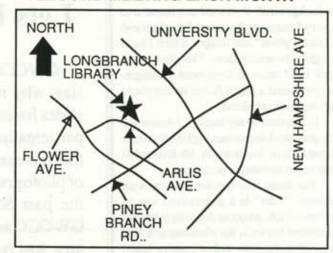
