# Print Meeting, May 18th

The May Print meeting will be held Thursday February 18th, 7:45 PM at the Longbranch Public Library. Our speaker and judge will be Carroll Morgan. Photography has been his avocation for many years. He is a color pictorialist and concentrates on outdoor subjects such as landscapes, seascapes, and nature. The C&O Canal National Historical Park, and nearby areas, are a particular favorite of Morgan's. He is a long-term volunteer lecturerer and photographer for the National Park Service.

Just recently, Morgan donated his 10year collection of 12,200 color transparencies, taken along the 184.5 miles of the canal, to the National Park Service's Archival Collection in Sharpsburg, Maryland.

Morgan has studied photography with Lowell Kenyon and is active in the Latent Image Workshop and the Council on Fine Art Photography. He has exhibited his work in the Washington area, and nearby cities and has won numerous local and national awards for his outdoor photography. His next solo exhibition is scheduled for the Potomac Community Center, in Potomac, MD, during the month of September 1989. Morgan recently retired from the Bell Atlantic Corporation and has lived in the Washington area for the last 17 years.



Using a view camera is a very, very slow process. Particularly when the camera is near the ground and pointing up at a sharp angle. Corbett, Charlie, Marty, and Antonio disassembled my press with no hassle. They determined what was wrong and fixed it without argument. When I asked the price, I was only charged for a new foam pad, which I had ruined somehow! They honored a warranty for a defective piece of equipment actually purchased four years ago (I had written about problems immediately after buying the press, but I had thought it was my technique, then it went into storage for about three years while I

So I commend the Bogen Corporation for standing behind their product and giving decent service to a customer. That is how it should always be!
