### Slide Meeting, September 7th

Don't forget - the Slide meetings have moved!! They are at the Argyle Community Center on Forest Glen Rd., 7:45 PM. The subject of the September Slide meeting will be commercial photography. What does a commercial photographer do, how to get work, and the like. The speaker (and judge) will be Les Henig who has done a little of a lot of things and is admirably qualified to talk on the subject. Les is a graduate of the University of Maryland in Journalism (with a major in photography). He has worked for several of the small local newspapers doing both photography and Journalism before moving on to spend 20 years with Pepco as a photographer. He is currently president of the Maryland Photographic Association and does weddings on the side.

### Print Meeting, September 21st

The September Print Meeting will be held at the Longbranch Library, starting promptly at 7:45. The speaker and judge will be Marion Warren who will talk to us about his many years photographing the Chesapeake Bay.

Perhaps Marion's best known photograph is his night portrait of the newlyopened Chesapeake Bay Bridge taken soon after it opened in 1952. His career has spanned fifty years, much of it on Baltimore, Annapolis, the Eastern Shore and other aspects of the Chesapeake Bay area. In 1987 Marion gave his extensive collection of Black and White photographs to the Maryland State Archives and is presently in the midst of presenting a year-long series of lectures sponsored by the Archives which explore the many themes of his work.



### An Award for Cause

On Banquet Night last June 8th, Stan Klem was awarded the Silver Spring Camera Club Service Award. Stan Klem's Service Award was given for a large variety of service achievements, many of which were rendered long before perhaps fully a third of the present membership joined. Of course you see or hear Stan Klem every slide meeting behind the projector — not merely pushing buttons but giving the tender manual care and feeding that our Leitz projector with its superior optics requires. Of course we might also mention the meticulous analog cum digital computer-like retrieval Stan manages when a judge wants to "see that landscape again." Stan has been our consistent and insistent competition projectionist for many years. (Note: Stan would like very much to pass this job onto someone who would volunteer for the duty. He deserves a break.)

Thus far it sounds like faint praise indeed. Of course there's more, much more. A few years ago when no one wanted to assume the office of club president, Stan took on those duties in a very professional and understanding manner. The message most of us got from Stan that year was that being president can be fun; it's stimulating and of course it is the most rewarding activity in SSCC—we should all take a crack at it.

The CABLE RELEASE editorship was prelude to the presidency. Our newsletter got a professional boost when Stan took it over in October 1983 lending all his accumulated editorial, literary and technical experience and sophistication to the enhancement of our eight-page newsletter. Standards he set that year have been maintained well beyond his tour—succeeding editors could dare to do no less, or (let's be real) almost as well!

Some of our most innovative slide workshops were Stan's creative contributions—portraiture, lighting, even emotion — "Make me laugh or make me cry, but don't bore me to death." "What X had in mind when he took this shot was to break all the conventions and still get a ribbon, etc." For those of us who have been "portfolioed" it's truly a beautiful day in court, a great ego trip!

Through Stan's years as SSCC we've witnessed a love affair: he loves photography; he loves his fellow members. What can then be more natural than for him to try to give to the people who share his enthusiasm whatever special creativity it is that sparks his own drive for photographic excellence.

#### Put Your Computer to Work

Many club members combine an interest in computers with their passion for photography. (Your editor being one!!) Here is one way I am putting my computer to work to make my work in the darkroom easier.

Any darkroom worker is familiar with the dial calculator in the Kodak darkroom guide that allows you to adjust your exposure time based upon the change in any given size or dimension from one print to another. If you have a good print where the distance across a house, or any other dimension in the image, is say six inches and you now want to make a print where that same dimension is twelve inches, the dial in the Kodak guide will tell you that the exposure will go from 10 seconds to 40 seconds (for example). To use the guide you have to do a lot of measuring in the dark. I get around the problem by reading the enlarger height from a scale on the column and recording it along with the other data (such as time, fstop, color head settings, etc) for each print. When I make a new print (or want to print a Cibachrome of an average density slide where everything is referenced back to a standard slide) all I need to do is look at the new enlarger height to calculate the new exposure. Here is the process:

(1) I measured the full width of the image projected on the baseboard for every 5 cm increment over the entire range of the height of the enlarger. (Don't forget to focus the enlarger at each height.) For example:

| Enlarger Height | Image Width |
|-----------------|-------------|
| 10              | 4           |
| 15              | 6.5         |
| 20              | 10          |

(2) I set up a spread sheet program that calculated the square of each dimension and interpolated between them to get the square of the four 1-cm increments between the measurements I made. (I also "normalized" all the calculations by dividing them all by the smallest value but that step isn't necessary and I didn't do this in the example below.)

(3) The resultant table is used as follows: Look at the chart to get the "squared value" for both the old enlarger height and for the new enlarger height. Then divide the base exposure used for the old print by the "squared value" from the chart for the old exposure and multiply it by the "squared value" from the chart for the new enlarger height. The result is the new exposure time. In the example used, if a good print was made at 30 seconds with an enlarger height of 11 cm and your new enlarger height is 15 cm your new time is (30/20.2) X 42.2 or 62.6 seconds.

Once you have made up the chart it is a lot easier to make adjustments this way than making a lot of measurements in the dark and use the Kodak dial.




