## Slide Meeting (February 1st)

The speaker and judge for the meeting on February 1 will be photographer-writer David Mangurian, who will show some of his photos and will discuss the process of putting words and pictures together to make a book.

Mr. Mangurian earned his master's degree in journalism at Columbia University in 1966. His first work experience was as a newspaper reporter, doing some photography. With a Pulitzer award requiring that he work outside of the United States, he went to Mexico. He sold a piece to Life Magazine for the Spanish edition, and did more assignments for it until it folded about 1969. At that time he decided to go into professional photography on a full-time basis. Spending 14 months traveling in Central and South America, he did magazine work and other assignments, including projects for UNICEF that resulted

in two books: Lito the Shoeshine Boy (set in Honduras) and Children of the Incas. In Chile in 1971 he married an Ecuadorean girl. After a stint as a television reporter for an ABC affiliate in Miami, he went back to free-lance work. In 1977 he joined the Interamerican Bank for Development, where he works to this day.

The subject for the competition will be Open.


### Print Meeting (February 15th) At the Longbranch

Public Library

The speaker for the meeting on February 15 will be world-famous freelance photographer Fred Maroon.

Although Mr. Maroon originally studied and received a degree in architecture, he moved quickly to the field of photography and began freelancing in 1954. In his early years he did extensive work for Holiday Magazine in covering the White House, and in fields of fashion and food photography all over the world. He has done major editorial assignments for more than a dozen major publications including National Geographic, Town and Country, Travel and Leisure, and Newsweek. His vast advertising and commercial accounts have included the Sheraton Hotels, E.F. Hutton, Northrop, and many others.

Mr. Maroon has traveled and exhibited his work worldwide. In this country

his most noted exhibitions were in the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Museum of Modern Art (both in New York City) and the Corcoran Gallery of Art and the National Gallery of Art (here in Washington, DC). He is also the recipient of Gold Medal Awards from the Art Directors Club of Metropolitan Washington and New York.

Mr. Maroon has either authored or coauthored eight books. Some of these include: Washington: Magnificent Capital; Courage and Hesitation; The Egypt Story; and These United States. His latest book is entitled Jean-Louis: Cooking with the Seasons. Currently, Mr. Maroon is working on two new books: one is about the Catholic University of America and the other is on his life as a photographer.

The subject for the print competition will be Open. As of press time the judge for the competition had not yet been selected, but will probably come from one of the area camera clubs.

### Letter to the Editor

Our president Jim Malaro wrote an editorial in the January issue of the Cable Release which attempts to answer the question of "why do you compete in club competitions?" I don't think either of his conclusions were entirely correct. True, we are all attempting to improve our photographic skills, or we would not be in the SSCC. However, we are also not necessarily here for the purpose of accumulating points for the sake of our ego's, although it is obviously the goal of a few members. I believe that we all desire honest and fair competitions which pit our skills against our "peers" or other members of equal ability. In my own case, I am a mediocre "Novice," who has been pushed beyond my level of incompetency into the "Advanced" class based on a long term accumulation of honorable mentions. As President Truman said "If you can't stand the heat get out of the kitchen." I have done this by not entering in club competitions.

You must realize that our Advanced class includes people like myself, and those of excellent abilities comparable to a true professional. Perhaps the club should review this situation and possibly resolve it by creating a new "Master" class for our professional class to help equalize levels of expertise.

## Exhibits: Travel the Ganges

At the Sackler Gallery of the Smithsonian (10th & Independence) through April 15th: India Along the Ganges, photographs by Raghubir Sing.

Sing's work is an evocative journey to another world—not just a travelogue, not just a loosely knit photojournalistic taste of a foreign country. This is a beautifully choreographed series of 70 prints that guide the viewer through a holy artery that is a fundamental element of a culture. The journey takes the viewer from the Headwaters of the Ganges at Gaumukh and the Gangotri Glacier in the Himalayas, to the Mouths of the Ganges in the Bay of Bengal.

Sing works with 35mm transparency film and the prints were done with internegatives. The technical quality is excellent throughout.

## Are Our Colors Fading?

Like many things in life, color dyes will fade with time. In fact, if you take a look at any product from our Great Yellow Father in Rochester, you will see a notice to this effect.

When I joined the Silver Spring Camera Club about 10 years ago, home color printing was still very much in its infancy. Various chemistries were fairly expensive (as were the papers), time-consuming with numerous steps, and they were not reliable. You couldn't really count on consistency. At least I couldn't with my strange darkroom techniques. Of course, there was Cibachrome. But it was (and still is) abominably expensive and I was never able to really get the hang of it for some reason or other (although my very best color print ever is on Cibachrome). Back then, a color print from a negative cost about twice that of the same size black and white print.

Today, at least while the supply of RT chemistry holds out, and hoping that I find

a suitable replacement, there are chemistries which are very suited to home use. The cost of a color print is only about 20% or 30% higher than that of the same size black and white print. The processing takes roughly the same time and number of steps as black and white—although, admittedly, I much prefer to see a B/W image appear in the tray as opposed to mindlessly watching a closed drum go round.

So then, why has'nt color printing caught on? Why are there fewer and fewer color entries at Print competitions?

Perhaps I can provide at least part of the answer. I personally find black and white printing to be more challenging and more rewarding (when I finally produce a really good print). I believe that it is more difficult to be creative and artistic in black and white. After all, you only have black and white and shades of grey in between with which to work. There are no bold reds, icy blues, or bright yellows screaming out at you. However, a beautifully executed color print can be very exciting. They also seem to show better in certain circumstances. For instance, in the colorless (and airless) prison in which I work (the Parklawn Building) I have hung some of my favorite B/W and color prints in my office's conference room. Even under the greenish fluorescent lights and against the sickly greenish white walls (the painter got a good price for the color under government contract), the color prints look better than the B/W.

Anyway, to the point of this article, yes—there is one, if you have considered trying color printing but shied away for any

of the above reasons, go for it! Just watch those green casts, Stein and Kreizman are merciless!

#### 16th Annual GWCCC Seminar


