Making an Annoying Job

Easy

n December, 1998, a celebrated triple domestic murder in Wichita, Kansas was solved by using a little known aspect of photographic technology. A digital electronic de-shredder was used to piece together a torn photo my matching contour lines, colors and brightness.

The photograph proved pivotal in this case because it documented the close relationship among the accused murderer and three members of a wealthy suburban Kansas family, all of whom had been found shot to death at a regional recreational park. The suspect was identified by a witness who testified at trial that the suspect had shot the three victims at point blank range through an open car window less than ten yards from the trail on which the witness had been hiking. The attorney for the defense argued that the defendant had not known the victims. The states prosecuting attorney presented evidence from a digital de-shredder. According to a jury spokesperson, the reconstituted photograph was critical in their decision to convict.

Eighty-seven fragments of an irregularly torn photograph had been recovered from a plastic bag at a waste disposal facility.

The fragments were laid out in random fashion on a Hewlett - Packard flatbed scanner and the

resultant images were selected, catalogued and numbered by a variant of Photoshop running on a MacIntosh 8500 Power PC. This program first selected fragments based on the dominant color and the brightness. These fragments were then organized on screen by spectral hue. When commanded to match lines and contours among various

fragments of similar color, the program then reconstructed the photo in its original format. This process revealed a group photo which included not only the three murdered family members but also the suspect himself.

An enlarged print produced from this reconstituted image was presented as states evidence to refute the suspects contention that he had never laid eyes on the victims.

A variant of this device has been used in aerial reconnaissance to align up to one thousand photos into a nearly seamless composite. Small differences in magnification and perspective induced by scanning off axis (away from the perpendicular between plane and ground) are corrected in this program to achieve better visual continuity.

On a less practical but somewhat amusing note, the electronic de-shredder was challenged to assemble through digital photographic images, a fifteen hundred piece jigsaw puzzle. It took twenty minutes longer for the assistants to set the pieces out for scanning than for the de-shredder to reconstitute the puzzle.

I will always be available at the meetings to answer questions concerning competition.
