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
President's Corner

Does Your Photoshop Read Norwegian?

Recently, the print size control on my wife's copy of Photoshop Elements 5 "went nuts"—print dimensions appeared more than twice their expected size, no matter what Elsa did. I even deleted and reinstalled the Photoshop software—to no avail. Eventually it dawned on us that her computer had been set to type Norwegian, and the dimensions we were seeing were all in centimeters (the standard in Norway). The Microsoft language software apparently had changed more than just the alphabet! In fact, now even the "English" dates on the bottom of E-mail on her computer print out in Norwegian!

On a different topic, I recently found some slides that date back more than 50 years. Though they had been stored under conditions that were far from archival, the colors in the old Kodachromes seemed relatively unchanged, but an Ansco Color slide from 1948 was low in contrast and had a rather orange cast. I scanned one of those old Kodachromes, and after hours of work with Photoshop Elements 5, (removing spots caused by dirt and fungi, cloning in more foreground and upper sky, adjusting contrast, etc.) the resulting print became my color print winner in March. Please note that the lightning flashes on the final print were as they appear on the original slide.

That slide was taken in the summer of 1950 (nearly 57 years ago), using my first 35 mm camera—a Kodak Pony 135. As I recall, that camera had an f 4.5 lens and cost about \$30. Despite reports that Elsa and I never use a tripod, I did use one for the three minutes needed to record the lightning flashes. I took the photo at about 10 PM, and virtually the only light for the picture came from intense lightning flashes that were all around me. At the time, I seriously wondered if I would survive the storm—but the image did look so impressive that I braved the chance of electrocution. (For the record, I wasn't hit).

s a child I was fascinated by science and photography. I learned to process and print black and white film with the family's Brownie camera and a home-made tin can enlarger at age 10. By high school I had discovered 35mm SLRs and

Kodachrome. At Virginia Tech I discovered scuba diving and caving (in lieu of studying); when I finally graduated in 1970, (BSc. Biology) I had invested most of my spendable income in macro equipment and lenses.

My career at the Smithsonian Natural History Museum began in 1972. I photographed the Exhibits Department's behindthe-scenes activities and some macro assignments for the scientific staff.

Now, almost 35 years later, I'm still at it!... diamonds to dinosaurs, fossils to fungi, bugs, skeletons, archeologists,







coral reefs, collections and critters; if it's in the Natural History Museum, I've probably photographed it at least once. I've also traveled extensively with the scientists documenting field research in a host of "way-off-the-beaten-path" locations around the world.

My images are used in the scientific literature, textbooks, popular market publications, and for Smithsonian publicity.

I've also done a modest amount of freelance photography for publishers like the National Wildlife Federation, National Geographic Society, W.H. Freeman & Co. (Scientific American), Time-Life books, and a host of other magazines and textbook publishers.

Melina Mara-Judge

elina Mara, the daughter of a CBS cameraman and a passionate Italian mother, was born in Englewood, New Jersey. She studied political science at Sarah Lawrence College, and after being disillusioned with law school became a teacher. Refocusing her career on photojournalism, Mara attended University of Missouri School of Journalism as a graduate student. Since then, she has worked for newspapers and magazines, and is presently a staff photographer at the Washington Post.

While a Seattle-based photojournalist, she began photographing the 13 women in the U.S. Senate in 2001, continuing the project as their number grew to 14 in 2003. In focused bursts, Mara traveled the country to document this defining period in the history of U.S. politics. At a time when access to national politicians is increasingly controlled, Mara persuaded the senators to allow her to document the unprecedented role of women in the Senate, both behind the scenes and before microphones and lights. Changing the Face of Power: Women in the U.S. Senate, a documentary work of the 14 female senators at work on Capitol Hill, opened at the Smithsonian Institution in May 2003 and is presently a traveling exhibit. The book was released in Fall 2005.












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SSCC, March Board Meeting Minutes

MEETING TOPICS:

1. Past Speakers and Judges

A list of speakers and judges covering the period November 2001 to May 2006 was compiled and made available to all attendees. Board members were encouraged to identify past speakers and judges who could be asked to speak or judge at SSCC during the 2007-08 club year.

2. Changes in SSCC Competition Rules and Constitution and By-laws

PSA News

fter many months of development, the new Photographic Society of America (PSA) Web site was finally on-line last month. This new Web site has been professionally designed to make it easier for viewers to navigate and locate the information they seek. The URL address of the new PSA Web site remains the same and you can find it at http://www.psa-photo.org

The new PSA Web site is, in effect, 8 Web sites integrated into one. In the past, each of the PSA Divisions (Color Slide, Pictorial Prints, Photojournalism, Photo Travel, Digital Imaging, Nature, and Stereo) had its own separately designed Web site and was thusly not consistent with each others.

The new PSA Web site home page features several large images that change every 5 seconds. In the site at this time are the "Best of Show" award-winning entries from the 2006 PSA International Salon competition. The images will be replaced with others on an irregular basis.


The main categories that make up the structure of the PSA Web site are located in the left column. There is a main section dealing with general PSA material, such as membership information, Board of Directors & International Representatives, Chapters, Audio/Visual Programs, etc. There is also a "Members only" section accessible only by entering the email that each PSA Member has on record with PSA.

The new Web site also has 7 other sections, one for each Division. These sections outline all the activities, competitions, study groups, and information relating to a particular Division. Special sections include information on the PSA Journal, PSA International Salon, and PSA annual International Conference. The PSA International Salon section includes all the information on how to enter its annual International Salon competition as well as a state-of-the art interactive

entry form area that allows each entrant to enter his/her images completely on-line. This section also includes information on Star Ratings, Who's Who in Photography, upcoming International Salons that will be held in different parts of the world, and Consolidated Exhibition Standards. The PSA annual International Conference section covers all the details about the programs, photo tours, training sessions and other activities of the 2007 PSA International Conference in Tucson, Arizona this September.

One unique item is a special "search" feature that allows anyone to enter any word or phrase and it will bring up a list of those pages that relate to your selected words. This will be a quick and easy way to find anything that you are looking for.

The new PSA Web site contains a wealth of rich information not only on PSA but also on basic photography in general. It is well worth your time to explore the new site.



National Wildlife Refuges

ome of the best opportunities for waterfowl photography are to be found in the vast network of 547 wildlife refuges in every state. Less than 10 miles from Silver Spring is the National Wildlife Visitor Center, located within the 12,000 acre Patuxent Research Refuge. In the fall and spring, a real pleasure (and great photo opportunity) is the arrival of wave after wave of Canada geese. The arrival of each flock is preceded by the sounds of honking geese. Then then appear above the trees, descending to the water, holding out their feet to skid across the sur-


face. The geese are one of over 200 species of birds that visit the refuge. Deer and small wildlife also can be seen.

The refuge is divided into two publicly accessible segments: 1) South Tract, where the National Wildlife Visitor Center and its trails are located, and 2) North Tract, which is open to the public for hunting, fishing, wildlife observation, and trails. The North Tract has restricted access (you can't leave your car) from October to February when killers (aka "hunters") go out and shoot deer.

Further a field is Eastern Neck Wildlife Refuge, near Rockhall, on Maryland's Eastern Shore where several short trails and viewing platforms can be found. Pelicans, bald eagles, Canada geese, and Tundra swans are some of the most outstanding waterfowl to be seen here. Surrounded by the Chesapeake Bay and Chester River, sunrises and sunsets and afternoon cloud formations can be spectacular throughout the year. Tall reeds provide good foreground for photographs.

As with any wildlife photography, a long focal length lens is essential for images of the waterfowl. A 300mm lens seems to be the minimum. Another challenge is that these refugees, and many others that cater to waterfowl, tend to be flat. There are very few places to get a higher view point, although observing platforms may be available. But even more, the physical conformity of the land poses a tough challenge for the landscape-oriented photographer.

Access to these and all wildlife refuges is free.



Directions:

Patuxent Research Refuge, South Track: Baltimore/Washington Parkway (Route 295) North, Exit 22 to Powder Mill Road-Beltsville exit. Turn right (east) onto Powder Mill Road and go 1.9 miles. Turn right into Visitor Center entrance—well signed. Go 1.4 miles to Visitor Center Parking area. Open sunrise-5:30 p.m.

North Track hours always begin at 8 a.m., but closing varies throughout the year. For more info, see the Web site (http://www.fws.gov/northeast/patuxent/index.htm). From the BW Parkway, take the exit for MD 198 and go East (right). The entrance road is about 1.4 miles from the Parkway, but keep a good lookout for the small entrance sign along that road. You must register to enter the North Track (driver's license).

Eastern Neck: U.S. Rt. 50/301 East across the Chesapeake Bay Bridge. Continue on Rt. 301 North after the 50 and 301 split. Exit Rt. 301 North onto Rt. 213 North towards Chestertown. Continue on Rt. 213 North into Chestertown. In Chestertown, turn onto Rt. 291 (also marked "to Rt. 20"). At the T-intersection, turn right onto Rt. 20 South towards Rock Hall. Follow Rt. 20 South for 12 miles to Rock Hall. At the blinking red light in Rock Hall, turn left onto Rt. 445. Follow Rt. 445 about 6 miles out of Rock Hall to the refuge entrance bridge. Open every day from 7:30 a.m. (sometimes earlier) to one half hour after sunset. Gates are locked otherwise, so don't get caught inside after sunset.

Kodak said it quit because it saw the presence of an outside party between it and its customers as "bureaucratic and unproductive."

Monte Zucker was famous for his portraiture and wedding photography. For more than 50 years he operated a studio in the Washington area—in Garfinkel's in Montgomery Mall, White Flint Mall in Rockville, and in Silver Spring.

He was an authority on posing, composition, lighting and all aspects of classical style. A true

leader and an incredible teacher who remained active giving demonstrations and seminars up to the last months. Monte turned heads 7 years ago by embrasing digital photography at a time when others were cautious at best. Monte was 77.

"I don't photograph the world as it is; I photograph the world as I would like it to be. I bring it together and help people create memories. Through my photography, I have tried to tell people how lucky we are to be alive, how lucky we are to be one big family together, how lucky we are to live in a world that accepts variance and diversity."
