Is Your Photo Less Than Perfect?

et's face it, we all have our limitations no matter how many competition points we have racked up. And then there are those photographs that we just cannot live without. You know the ones; happy snaps of family, friends, and even pets. How about the sunset shot you got on that expensive trip you took? You want to display it in your home, to cover the big blank wall space above the couch.

Not a problem if they are all picture perfect images—all you need is a simple mat and frame along with a hammer and a nail. Am I being too wordy? Are you thinking about now— Where is he going with this? Yes, I will get to it in a minute, but first I have to get something off my chest.

I am only one of seventy-something people who happen to be members of the Silver Spring Camera Club. I want to sincerely thank everyone who has ever sent me an e-mail with something in it that I can put in the *Cable Release*. This is my third year and we (yes, wee wee) have received two awards so far—an HM and a 2nd, in the annual PSA newsletter competition. Maybe you are satisfied, but I am not. Unfortunately, I cannot do better without your help.

I need news and articles..., about you, the world of photography, equipment reviews, How2s, and things of local interest, interesting places to go shoot. Do you think you cannot write? Well, it does not have to be perfect. Perfect? Oh yeah let's see, where was I? Georgetown!

There is a new framing store in Georgetown—excuse me, a French framing store—called L'Eclat de Verre. Right away you know the shopping bag is going to cost dearly, which is why you should plan to walk around the area afterward for as long as possible strutting your stuff. Just do it in midday sun.

The store sells handmade papers for \$2.50 to \$43 a sheet. The *CR* has tried to find out exactly how big a sheet is, but so far no one has retuned the call. The concept is more about the area **<u>between</u>** the print and the frame. The whole focus is on the mat. Expect to pay around \$400 for a 9x12.

They also offer workshops for make-your-own framing and cartonnage (which I think you have to pronounce cartonnáge), a technique for making paper products such as albums, folders and boxes. Workshop prices range from \$55 to \$70, not including the cost of paper. Fancy mat—several hundred dollars; article for the CR—priceless.

President's Corner

I have been going through the recent book Ansel Adams: 400 photographs. The images span his career, from childhood into the 1960s. The first several pages include photos he took in the late teens and early 1920s. Two things strike me in the early images. One, most of the images showed a limited technical and compositional competency. In one, the shadows are too dark to see any detail—a problem I also have. I think, "Well, if Adams had this problem and eventually solved it, perhaps I can, too." Second, I can see steady improvement in Adams' images as he gained skill and confidence. By the late 1920s, both his style and mastering of the art are clearly evident.

I take encouragement from seeing these early photos by a world-class photographer. I am reminded that creating a good photograph only occurs after a fairly lengthy time—to know the camera, understand lighting conditions, develop an eye for compositions, and printing. That growth is a process of learning and regular practice.

The process can be moved along with good guidance and peer support. Silver Spring Camera Club offers all these elements to build our skills. I really appreciated the critiques and feedback I received at last month's Third Thursday meeting. At that meeting we had time to really look at a photo and discover its strengths and where improvements could be made. That, to me, is really valuable. I wish more members would take part in the Third Thursday meetings. We can shape those meetings to fit out needs and interests. We can hear what others are learning and learn from those who have also struggled with similar issues.

My impression of all the members of the Club is that each of us seeks to transform the reality we see around us into an emotional experience. We want to say "Wow!" after we take the shot or see the image on the computer or in print. And, I expect, we all hope to hear other people say "Wow!" about our images. But to get to that point, we need discussion, peer comments, and a chance to learn from accomplished photographers.

We are all like Ansel Adams, somewhere on the spectrum of developing and refining our skills to create more of the "Wow" images. ____


ART In Embassies Program–DC



Bill Prosser



Bill Prosser is a local McLean artist who has been a serious amateur photographer for over 35 years. He studied under a number of local teachers and mentors: Marty Kaplan, Joe Miller, Jim Steele, and Eliot Cohen, and Canadian, Freeman Patterson. He gave up the chemical darkroom for the computer in 1995 and film for the digital chip in 2000 after learning Photoshop and working photographic images in his digital darkroom. Also in 1995 Bill began his current volunteer work at McLean High School teaching and mentoring students in visual design, photography, and Photoshop. He has also assisted Eliot Cohen in teaching Smithsonian Institution Photoshop classes.

Bill is a founding member, and past-president, of the McLean Photography Club and a 17-year member of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society (NVPS). He is currently an NVPS Digital Imaging Mentor. In recent years Bill earned NVPS Photographer-of-the-Year awards for Digital Imaging Photography and Advanced Color Printmaking, plus the Versatile Photographer of the Year. Several of his black-and-white, color, and digital photographs also received NVPS Image-of-the-Year awards.

Bill has exhibited his photographic images at University of Wisconsin-Madison and locally at the Fairfax County Government Center, Arlington Henley House, the Fairfax Virginian Retirement-Community Center, and the Reston Unitarian-Universalist Church. The Georgetown University Graduate Public Policy Institute purchased seven of his Washington, DC images to hang in the Faculty and Administrative Office.

A Lens Is Like an Eye Focusing on Emotions

The true lens of the camera is in the mind and heart of the photographer. This is the lens that lets us all appreciate the beauty in the world around us.

The lens that looks at a sunset, a flower, a dramatic landscape or a smile of a child and really gets "turned on" is not the lens in front of the camera. Rather, it is the lens inside the photographer.

We all know about grammar in the English language. We know where to place the commas and the periods. What is important is to do as the writer does. He is not as concerned about where the comma goes as he is about the words flowing from his heart. The writer makes grammar the secondary thing, just as the photographer makes the mechanics a secondary thing and concentrates on the importance of what he is feeling and trying to "say" with his photographs.

Photographs speak in a strong language. They can bring out a person's raw emotions and can make someone happy, sad, and even angry.

Photographs can stir people to action or just make us feel good. They can make visible what others can only sense.

Remember, it is not the brush of the artist that produces the painting, not the bow of the violin that produces the music nor the pen of the poet that writes the sonnets nor the camera which produces the photograph.

Schwarzenegger Proposes Closing 48 State Parks

"Today, the Governor took aim at California's treasured state parks, releasing a budget that contains the most draconian cuts ever considered for the state park system," declared Elizabeth Goldstein, president of the California State Parks Foundation (CSPF). "Never before have so many parks, and such a diversity of state parks, state historic parks, state recreation areas, and state beaches been placed on the chopping block. The millions of Californians who visit their parks will not tolerate this and will lead the fight to keep our state parks open."

Bush Proposes \$2 Million Cut from the National Arboretum's \$4.9 Million Budget

The 446 acres of rolling green land in Northeast D.C. is a sanctuary for azaleas, dogwoods and Bonsai, but WTOP has learned the U.S. National Arboretum is bracing for massive budget cuts that could result in 20 percent of the 80-person staff being laid off, as well as shortening visitor hours.


