A Word From the President Bill Rau

Happy 2009, everyone! This year the Silver Spring Camera Club ends its 6th decade of photography activities. SSCC is one of the oldest camera clubs in the region, if not the country.

As you know, the Club is run entirely by volunteers. We are drawn together by common interest in and passion for good photography. Our constitution and competition rules provide structure and guidelines for our activities. In addition, the board of directors meets three or four times a year to consider issues relevant to our activities.

This month, the board will meet on the 3rd Thursday (January 22nd), in place of the usual workshop activities. Members are welcome at all board meetings. By holding this board meeting during a normal club meeting we hope to increase your understanding of Club decisionmaking. We also hope you will attend as a part of your involvement in the running and direction of the Club.

Club members are welcome to add topics to the board meeting agenda, to raise issues during the board meeting, and to engage in discussion of the issues. However, only board members can vote on issues that require a decision.

I invite you to attend this board meeting and add your insights and ideas to the Club's activities. I also invite you to add to the draft agenda topics listed below. Please contact me with your ideas or thoughts for agenda topics, or bring them up during the board meeting itself.

The draft agenda for the January 22, 2009 SSCC board of directors meeting includes:

- 1) Digital competitions--the final steps
- A. The Club is prepared to buy a digital projector.
 - A final decision is needed on a specific machine
 - Other equipment needs

- B. Software is available for running digital competitions.
 - Guidelines are needed for submitting digital images.
- C. Organizing competition images is needed
- A person(s) is needed to manage competition images
 D. Competition rules must be reviewed to assure compatibility with digital competitions.
- 2) SSCC website--we must finalize a new website.
 - A. Initial design and content development are underwayAdditional content needs to be drafted and uploaded to website.
 - B. Review of draft website is needed.
 - Identify 2 or 3 people to review and suggest changes.
 - C. Settle on website host.
 - Review options (cost, space available, ease of access) and select host.
- 3) Suggestions for 2009-10 competition themes
 - Each club year, 3-4 themes are selected for competition, in addition to October's theme of Nature. Also, the constitution indicates that every other year (i.e., the 2009-2010 club year), a Body of Work competition is possible.
 - Suggestions for themes for 2009-10 are needed.
 - A decision on whether to hold a Body of Work competition is needed.
- 4) 2009-10 officers--looking ahead and preparing
 - All officers and most chairs have held their positions for 2 years. New officers and chairs may be needed for 2009-10.
 - Discussion of interest and intent by current officers/ chairs in continuing
 - Discussion of ways to encourage and engage other members to consider running.
- 5) Identify a Club representative to Photographic Society of America (PSA).
- 6) Other Issues

I look forward to seeing you at the board of directors meeting on January 22, 2009.

SSCC Meeting Location

All three major monthly meetings for this Club Year (2008-09) will be held at the Marvin Memorial United Methodist Church at Four Corners in Silver Spring. Directions are as follows:


From downtown Silver Spring: go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.

From College Park/Takoma Park: take University Blvd. West. As you approach Rte. 29, move to your far left lane and turn left into church parking lot B. Or, you can pass through Rte. 29 intersection and turn left at the loop just past MacDonalds. Proceed on University Blvd. East, pass through Rte. 29 intersection, and quickly get in the far left lane and enter into church parking lot A.

From points north of Four Corners: proceed south on Rte. 29 and turn right onto University Blvd. West, move into the far left lane and turn left at the loop just past the MacDonalds. Proceed through Rte. 29 intersection, and turn left into church parking lot A.

From Wheaton and points west of Four Corners, go east on University Blvd. As you pass through Route 29 intersection, turn left into parking lot A.

Wherever you park, walk to the southeast corner of the Church and enter Room 204. All of our meetings begin at 7:30 p.m.

Guest Speaker - January 8th Maxwell Mackenzie

Maxwell Mackenzie has provided award-winning large-format and digital photography services for architectural, interior design, corporate, advertising, health-care, hospitality, retail, and editorial clients since 1981.

Maxwell MacKenzie earned a BA degree from Bennington College, in Vermont in 1975, with a dual major in architecture and photography. He began his photographic career in an old coffee warehouse on the Thames, in Wapping, East London, shooting ads and editorial work in England and Europe. In 1981 MacKenzie moved his base to Washington, DC and began specializing exclusively in shooting architecture and interiors. He did postgraduate work at the Corcoran Gallery School of Art, and studied with two of the best practitioners in his field: Peter Aaron of ESTO Photographics at the Maine Photographic Workshop, and Nick Merrick of Hedrich Blessing at the Santa Fe Photo Workshop. MacKenzie himself has taught weeklong master classes at the Palm Beach Photographic Centre, Montgomery College, Md, and recently taught a workshop at the International Center of Photography in NY entitled: "The Poetry of Places, Exploring the Beauty of the Man-Made". He has received individual artist grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, Graham Foundation for Advanced Studies in the Visual Arts, and the DC Commission on the Arts.

MacKenzie has authored three books of panoramic & aerial fine-art photography and has been widely exhibited in galleries and museums nationwide. His photographs can be seen in numerous private, corporate, and institutional collections, including permanent collections of U.S. Embassies in Bogota, Columbia; Abidjan, Cote D'Ivoire; Conakry, Guinea; Moscow, USSR; Kathmandu, Nepal; Dushanbe, Tajikistan; and Lima, Peru.

MacKenzie's commercial work is featured on over a thousand websites, and has been published in brochures, books, and magazines worldwide, including over 500 covers. He is highly regarded for his exquisitely orderly, precise, and balanced compositions, and for the artful sensitivity and subtlety of his lighting. Continually in demand, MacKenzie's work has taken him throughout the U.S., and overseas to Austria, the Bahamas, Bermuda, Brazil, England, France, the Galapagos, Germany, Greece, Italy, Mauritius, Mexico, Morocco, Norway, Scotland, Spain, Switzerland, and Wales.

Competition Judge - January 15th Marti Belcher

Marti Belcher comes to us from the Vienna Photography Society in Northern Virginia, and was their B&W Photographer of the Year in 2007. She is currently a resident artist at the Lorton Arts Center and a member of the League of Reston Artists. Her academic credentials includes four degrees: an AA in Humanities (1981), BA in American Government (1984), and two AAS degrees--one in Graphics Design (2003) and another in Photography (2005).

Marti's artistic perspective and eventual photographic success are rooted in her simple upbringing in upstate New York, where her grandfather operated a dairy farm and her parents made TV antennas for a living. She came to realize that the tranquility of agrarian life, the nitty-gritty of the factory environment, and now, the speed and sterility of the age of technology, has blessed her with an uncommon vantage point. But it wasn't until 2003, when she started studying photography as a graphic design student, that it all came together—and she finally found her creative mechanism with photography.

In her own words, Marti "strives to find a way to reveal the simple, basic, and honest emotions found in each and every one of us . . . The phrase, 'the human condition', is often used to describe poignant photographs of people that live in distant places. What I have come to understand is that <u>all</u> of us are examples of the human condition, wherever our sod hut, farmhouse, or estate may be. My



portraits and photography will always be about our similarities, not our differences."

Making the Switch to Digital Photography by Sandy Littlejohn

I've always loved taking pictures. The usual: friends, trips, birthdays, and of course holidays. Halloween is a favorite of mine. There were usually some prize-winning costumes, but never any prize winning photos.

My camera at that time was a Kodak Oneshot, and it served me well for about 40 years. Of course there were pictures I liked--even some I liked a lot. But never did I get the photos I dreamed of getting or trying to get. So I lived with the idea that I'm just not a good photographer.

After 40 years of faithful service my old camera developed a few problems and was on its way out. It was the summer of 2007 and I had gone to Ritz Camera to pick up some pictures. That's when I noticed a Sony digital camera on sale. It had all the features I couldn't live without: 7.2 megapixels, no shutter delay, multi-shot burst (as Sony calls it), and a zoom lens. Wow, I was a hot shot now! I couldn't wait to start shooting.

The Sony was a nice camera, and I was very happy with lots of my photos: the sharpness, the vivid colors, all those great features. I even won a couple of prizes at the Montgomery County fair. I thought: "This is more like it." One of the winning photos was taken on a field trip with SSCC. I felt like this is the world's best camera, until . . .

One morning I noticed a pair of wrens had moved into the wren house that hung in the dogwood tree out back. I got excited and thought: "I'm going to get some great pictures." After about an hour of setting up a makeshift blind I decided, "This is where the burst feature is going to be terrific." I then happily clicked away the hours.

I knew I had taken some terrific shots --the best one was a wren with a spider in its beak ready to

pop into the mouths of her little ones. But to see the spider, you had to blow up the shot so much that all you could see was noise.

I soon realized that an upgrade to the Sony was not an option–and I must have an SLR with a much longer and sharper zoom. This time I went to Penn Camera and bought a Canon 40D.

This whole process of upgrading my equipment and striving to take better pictures has been great fun. I'm also learning so much from the SSCC members. So thanks to all who have offered me a helping hand.

I take pictures for the same reason I always did: to save the moments you wish could last forever. When I look back through my photos, even the old Kodak shots are more vivid than my memory.

Today, my bird pictures (thanks to "delete") are no longer dots in a tree. They are sharp and have that catch light in their eyes. The background is out of focus, making it a joy to look at. Honestly, I shoot photos for myself--but when I get a terrific one it's wonderful to share it with people who appreciate that same joy with their own efforts.

So here's to happy shooting and clearer, sharper, more colorful memories!

Cheap Thrills

- ✓ Bouquet of flowers (some with branch points to better collect water droplets; some with vivid and distinct centers for focal points)..... \$40
 ✓ 10 vases (2 for each work station)..... \$20.
 ✓ Foral foam and tape (to stabilize flowers).... \$5.
 ✓ Assorted boxes to adjust the relative height of the flowers
- ✓ Spritzer with water ± a touch of glycerin or soap (to adjust surface tension of the water droplets)
- \checkmark Flashlight (for introducing spot highlights)
- √ 20+ assorted members of the NIH and Silver Spring camera clubs
- √ Cameras and close-up optics (macro lenses, close-up lenses, and extension tubes)
- \checkmark Tripods (standard and tabletop) \pm macro rails
- √ Patience, Patience, Patience







The Challenge

Participants oriented themselves and the posterior flower to provide the correct angles for the production of reflections in water droplets on the stems of the anterior flower. (The most critical element was to indentify an image in the droplet by eye and then to make adjustments of the elements while looking through the camera lens. Because the image is inverted, it was important to move the posterior flower opposite to the apparent position.)

Results: Priceless!!!

For those who are interested in learning more about this technique and use of the Wimberly Plamp clamp [~\$40], Lindsay Adler has prepared a video at www.youtube.com/user/adlerphotoworkshops.

In addition to this exercise, several participants took advantage of the beautiful blooms by taking standard macro shots \pm water drops and backlit shots.
