Directions:


From downtown Silver Spring: go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.

Guest Speaker-March 5 Taisie Berkeley

Taisie Berkeley excels in capturing the emotions of those she photographs. She has won national recognition for her photojournalism of people, which have been featured in *The Washington Post*, *Washingtonian* magazine, *The New Republic*, *Kiplinger Personal Finance* magazine, and elsewhere.

In 2006 she returned from a Fulbright Scholarship to India where she documented, through images and interviews, the plight of India's poorest women. She is currently exhibiting this project at the Eleanor B. Wilson Museum in Roanoke, Virginia. In Delhi, her project was exhibited at the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts.

In 1997 Berkeley appeared on *CBS This Morning* to discuss her *Washingtonian* multi-image series, "Catherine's Song," for which she twice won Washington, D.C. Society of Professional Journalists' Dateline Award for Excellence in Local Journalism (1986,1996) at the National Press Club. She also was featured in the Missouri Journalism School/National Press Photographers Association *Best of Photojournalism* (vol.12), and the New York Art Directors' Club *Art Directors' Annual*.

Other commercial clients include National Geographic Society, Houghton Mifflin, the Children's Defense Fund, The Wilderness Society, and Time-Life Books.

As a fine-art photographer with an MFA, Ms. Berkeley has studied with Sally Mann, Mary Ellen Mark, Bruce Davidson, Eugene Richards, Joyce Tenneson, Christopher James, and Amy Arbus. Her work also has been exhibited at the Arlington National Cemetery's Faces of the Fallen Exhibition and Washington, D.C.'s Corcoran Gallery of Art.

Competition Night-March 12 Judge: Mary Ann Setton

Mary Ann is both a past VP for Competitions and Past President of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society (NVPS), and is a retired human resources manager who has been blessed with the

opportunity for a second life as a photographer. She is a 1995 graduate of the Washington School of Photography and has augmented that training with many photography and Adobe Photoshop courses, including the famed Freeman Patterson's Photography and Visual Design Workshop in 2007. Her experience also includes professional photography and videography work and until 2006, Mary Ann ran a portrait studio in her home.

Her images have won numerous awards in the Northern Virginia Photographic Society, ribbons from the Vienna Photography Shows where she won "Best In Show" in 2001, and several images have been juried into the Art League of Alexandria's monthly exhibits at The Torpedo Factory, where she also won a prestigious Equal Award in 2002 and maintained a bin for two years. She was named NVPS "Photographer of the Year" in both 2005 and 2006 in the category of Enhanced Prints and won two "Print of the Year" Awards in 2000 and two again in the 2005. She has presented programs on "Digital Magic" which explore the roots of her Photoshop learning and the creative processes employed. She has had photographs published in the élan Magazine and two articles were written about her and her work in that same publication in 2003 and 2005. She was the featured photographer on the cable TV program "Photographers of Northern Virginia" in 2002 and also substituted for the regular host on occasion during subsequent years. She has experience as a judge and critique leader and in December, 2006, she completed Joe Miller's Seminar on Judging.

Mary Ann and her husband, Dick, recently moved to the northern Shenandoah Valley area where she has organized a Photography Club in her new active adult community and is looking forward to many self assignments by exploring the beautiful countryside and inspirational views that are in abundance there.

The Mysteries of Depth of Field: Solved!

Please Note the Earlier Start Time!

Are you flummoxed by depth of field? Do you leave your choice of aperture setting to the camera? Do you long to photograph landscapes in which everything is pin-point sharp? Then attend the March workshop! Fred Schirrmacher will present a short chalk talk on the subject. This will be followed by use of a hyperfocal length calculator wheel

(ExpoAperture) developed by the same folks who brought you the ExpoDisc for white balance. Participants will have the opportunity to try out their skills on a runway marked at foot-long intervals so bring your camera, lenses, and a tripod. Beth Koller has 6 sets of ExpoAperture calculators for use during the workshop. Each set consists of a calculator wheel for a standard lens and another for a telephoto lens. If you'd like to own your own, they will be available for cost, ~\$40.

When Water and Your Camera Do Mix

Beth Koller will discuss some of the options for using your camera around water. She will comment on waterproof cameras, housings, and carriers—especially from the perspective of a paddler.

Thoughts provoked by Robert Frank's photographs Bill Rau

As I viewed and tried to absorb the photographs of Robert Frank, now on display at the National Gallery of Art, a couple thoughts - relevant, I think, for our Club - crossed my mind. Frank photographed during the 1940s in Europe, and in the 1950s and 1960s in the U.S., where he had immigrated following World War II. His focus in the U.S. was on the American people and the conditions they lived in.

Perhaps because he was an immigrant and seeing the U.S. in ways that were new and curious at discovering a society, Frank brought an especially insightful eye to his subjects. His images depict workers and people in their normal settings, technological changes occurring, and the everyday elements of our environment. His are street photographs, caught in a moment, but with lasting impact. His photos are visual images of the people and situations often captured in Studs Terkel's interviews. I really like this type of

photography, but with each image I wanted to know more about the context - who are these folks, what's going on?

For those of us who may not take photos as good as Frank's, it seems to me that words to accompany our images can be very helpful. The words can further explain what we are trying to say through an image.

I also suspect that some of Frank's images would not get beyond a first cut during our competitions. Although well composed, some of the images are so "everyday" in their depiction that I wonder if they would stand up to a judge's standards.

These two thoughts - wanting to know the context and suitability for camera club competitions - come together in my mind as I wonder if the monthly competitions in our Club have become too standardized. It is great to see one another's photos every month, but the Club has done competitions in mostly the same way for



Workshop Report: Michael Koren On the Mark With a Point and Shoot Beth Koller

Michael Koren, a SSCC member and competition chair, in an excellent interactive program, guided club members through the in-and-outs of point-andshoot cameras. He indicated that while some cameras do everything for the photographer automatically and permit few creative choices, there are many cameras that would be suitable for the developing photographer who has not yet entered the realm of SLR cameras or the advanced photographer who would like a spare camera to always have at the ready. Point and shoots are also ideal for use in challenging environments when space, weight, and hermitic sealing are considerations. His gear: a 5 megapixel Pentax digicam with a strap that can be used for stabilization, a flexible 5 inch tripod, a small reflector, a grey/white card, spare memory cards, a tissue for diffusion, a lens cloth, and a wide angle lens adapter, all of which fit into his compartmentalized camera pouch of 8x6x3



inches. In Michael's comprehensive presentation there were several items of note:

- 5 or 6 megapixels can easily generate excellent 8x10 prints.
- Higher pixel count, crowded onto a small APS-size sensor, can increase noise.
- The advanced photographer should carefully consider the features of the camera that are most important to him or her. Michael knew that it would be very difficult to control the flash because of its on-camera location, so he chose a camera in which he could control the flash output. Michael also cautioned about carefully reading the specifications for the zoom lens. Only optical zoom should be considered; digital zoom achieves "closeness" through cropping and information loss.
- The advanced photographer will want as many controls as possible, but will likely want to do some of the image processing, e.g., sepia toning or black-white conversion on the computer rather than in-camera.
- Although creative control will be optimized by using manual settings, aperture priority, or shutter priority, an understanding of the rationale behind a "scene program" may facilitate control. In addition, the physical distances between the sensor and lens limit the depth-offield control in point-and-shoot cameras.
- The type of memory card you currently use may influence your camera selection, permitting you to use cards interchangeably. Most point-and-shoot cameras employ SD or xD memory cards. SD cards are more universal.
- Images should be saved to the highest levels of resolution for best results. Most cameras have high level JPG files that can be converted into TIFF files for lossless manipulation. A few cameras use RAW files with or without concomitant JPG files.

Michael enjoys taking pictures and does not particularly enjoy extensive computer time—so JPG is good enough for him and has garnered him some prize winning photographs.

Michael also enjoys *doing things* with his photographs. Besides standard matting and framing, he has experimented with using luminescent papers, making cardboard fold-out books, creating greeting cards, and using digital photo displays. The audience was very interested in the various wares he presented.

Methods

- 1) Blank survey forms were made available to members during at least five club meetings throughout the Fall of 2008.
- 2) There were 35 respondents. If a person did not provide an answer to a broad or demographic category, the lack of response was coded as NA (not available).
- 3) People were asked to rank their interest in an activity. Since many did not do it this way, the analysis simply determined whether a respondent was interested or not. A blank or zero was coded as a not interested.
- 4) People were not precluded from having multiple interests within a category. If they indicated an interest, it was coded in the affirmative. If they included write-in interests, these were included and so delineated.
- 5) In some cases multiple answers were possible. For example, the survey results delineated how many respondents had more than one camera and how many respondents were in multiple competition categories.

Comments on Results

- 1) Over half of respondents have a digital camera. Many of those who competed in novice classes had a digital camera.
- 2) Most respondents were interested in learning more about photography through lectures (83%), field trips (83%), and/or workshops (80%).
- 3) Over one-third of respondents were not interested in competition.
- 4) Respondents indicated a marked interest in improving the technical

and composition aspects of their picture taking.

- 5) Respondents indicated a broad spectrum of topics about which they were interested—including portraiture, flash use, and night photography.
- 6) Respondents indicated a strong interest in learning how to present their work in a variety of formats—including matted/framed prints, slide shows, and books.
- 7) Other analyses are possible, but these basic results were provided to generate discussion and questions and to assist with planning future activities and budget items. Currently, supplies, refreshments, and speaker gifts for the Third Thursday workshops are not budget items and have not been covered by SSCC.

To copy a layer, type Ctrl-J (on Macs, Cmd-J). It's generally a good idea to work on a copy of your background or original layer in case you need to go back to the original. Copying the layer doubles the file size, however, which might slow your computer down a bit.
