All three major monthly meetings for this Club Year will be held at the Marvin Memorial United Methodist Church at Four Corners in Silver Spring. **Directions:**


From downtown Silver Spring: go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.


Editor's Corner: Oops! Dave Mullen



Photoshop Tip of the Month

Better Shadows/Highlights

The Shadow/Highlight feature can do a pretty good job, but it sometimes gives the shadows a "milky" look. To avoid this, open Shadow/ Highlight (Image>/Adjustments>Shadow/ Highlight). Click on the Show More Options checkbox, then lower the Shadow Amount from the default of 50% to around 20%. Increase the Tonal Width a little and the Radius setting a lot until the shadows are opened but it doesn't look overly-processed. Then increase the Amount slider if needed.



Got a Nikon? Become a Command Freak! Craig Callan

Once you start taking pictures seriously, you soon realize that one of the things that indicates quality work is control of lighting. The flat, harshshadowed world of flash on camera that works so well in the family album doesn't make it in a competitive club environment.

It's possible to get great results from a single light used off the lens axis to create modeling and illuminate detail. One of the easy ways to do this is a remote flash cord like the Nikon SC-29, but you can only move the flash away from the lens axis the length of the cable – about 3 feet. Often you may want to move the flash further away than that.

Nikon Digital SLR cameras offer a "wireless command mode" for use with their dedicated SB-600, SB-800, and SB-900 electronic flashes. Many of us have salivated over videos and brochures illustrating how this system allows exquisite control over complex multiple flash setups. Or maybe we have looked with equal longing at the wireless Pocket Wizard units that also allow remote flash control.

What many of us may not realize is that if you have a Nikon DSLR with a built in flash, you can use that flash in command mode to control a single Nikon SB-series flash for wireless off-camera use. I have used my SB-800 with both a D-70 and a D-90 with excellent results.

Here's how it's done on my Nikon D-90 and SB-800 – you may have to poke around or Heaven Forbid, read the manual to find the equivalent setting on your camera and flash:


ON THE D-90 Camera:

Select the "PENCIL" icon from the left hand menu

- Go to menu choice "e Bracketing/Flash" and press the right button to move to the sub-menu
- From the sub-menu, select "e2 –Flash cntrl for built-in flash" Press the right button
- Select "C Commander Mode>" and press the right button to move to the Command sub-menu
- OK, now it gets complicated There are seven blanks to fill in. You move from one to the next by using the right button, and change the entry in each blank by using the up and down buttons. Set the "Built-in flash" and "Group A" settings to "TTL"; and the "Channel" to "3". Press "OK" to save the settings when you are done.

ON THE SB-800 Flash:

- Turn the flash ON, and press and hold the SEL button in the middle of the Flash Selector Dial for TWO SEC-ONDS. You will see the Special Setting Menu. Us the directional buttons on the Flash Selector Dial to go to the second menu item, which looks like two flashes with squiggly lines next to them. When you highlight this item, you will see the following choices – OFF, MASTER, MASTER(RPT), REMOTE, SU-4. Press the SEL button, and you will see up and down arrows appear in the menu. Use the directional buttons to select REMOTE, and press SEL again. Now press and hold SEL for TWO SECONDS to go back to the flash menu.
- You should now see REMOTE in the center of the flash display. Press SEL briefly, and you see the Channel Menu at the upper left of the display highlighted. Now use the up and down directional buttons to highlight Channel 3. Press SEL again, and the Group menu at lower right of the display will be illuminated. Use the up and down directional buttons to highlight GROUP A, and briefly press the SEL button to select the setting.
- You're done. When you want to remotely trigger the flash, pop up the small built-in flash and make an exposure. You should see the SB-800 trigger at the same time.
- If it doesn't work, check your settings. There are a lot of steps, and you may need some practice to get them all.

Summer/Autumn Workshop Portfolio Development

"What can I do with all the photos I have?" Answer: Take a portfolio development workshop with SSCC member Charlie Bowers!

A portfolio is a collection of photographs build around a common theme (with sub-themes possible) or a common style. Portfolios can be a handful of images, 30 or so images for display on a website, or 70-80 images to fill a book. A photographer's portfolio represents their best work—in quality, composition, technical details, and presentation.

The Last Laugh: May Third Thursday Workshop Report Beth Koller

We had a packed program and a full house for the May workshop. Nicholas Seckler provided a sample of the

results he obtained using the new Kodak Ektar 100 print film that was distributed at the Depth of Field workshop. He reports: "What sets Kodak Ektar apart is it's extremely fine grain. I scanned in negatives at 4800 dpi and was unable to discern any texture from grain, though results may vary with different scanners, software, and negatives. It is highly



saturated, not as much as Velvia but certainly more than Kodak Porta NC. The color is closer to real than surreal. Given my predilection for subtlety I would probably not use it for nature photography. At a glance it appears to be very sharp, although I'll be able to tell more definitively after testing it in medium format. For those interested in making large grainless prints in vivid color, this is a great choice."

Bernie van Leer, a member who specializes in street photography, brought a classic book about humor in photography for members to view.

The new Epson projector made its debut. Prior to the meeting, Bob Catlett explored some of the cable connection requirements. Beth Koller received a tutorial about the various connectors from Mr. Whitten at MicroCenter and assembled all of the pieces need to

connect old and new Apple laptops, PC laptops, our projector, and other projectors using products from RadioShack and Microcenter. Dave Mullen, not willing to leave anything to chance, brought a projector as well. When comparing the difference between his projector, which was meant for PowerPoint presentations, with the new projec-

tor, which is meant for photographic presentations, Dave was astounded by the color and scored it a 10!

In follow-up to our recent practicum on polarizing films/filters, MyPhuong Nuygen gave a 20 minute presentation on filters. She talked about the two basic systems: screw-on round filters and square filters in a Cokin or Lee type adapter. She discussed neutral density filters, graduated density filters, reverse density filters, color intensifiers, blue-gold polarizing filters, soft (Tony Sweet) filters, and infrared filters/cameras. Through her own photographs and the photographs of others she demonstrated the effects of the various

used to slow water flow and provide a milky effect. She showed how graduated filters could be used to retain foreground detail in the setting of a light sky. She showed how a reverse filter

could be used to differentially reduce blow-out at the horizon level. She showed how rotating 2-part filters could change the hue and temperature of an image. She also provided information on the relative costs of the filters.

text, image resolution requirements, workflow issues, binding and cover options, and turn-around time of the two methods. Two methods of creating a book on Blurb were shown, one using the prepackaged Blurb layouts and one using Photoshop to create individual pages with total control over the layout. He showed how he put together a 300-page book for his wife's birthday, and how he plans to put together the SSCC 2008-09 Yearbook. Issues around file size, resolution, and color space were discussed, and might prove fruitful topics for programs next year.

He has used his photographic skills to benefit the Kennedy Center, the Montgomery Coalition for the Homeless, the Montgomery Housing Opportunities Commission, and the





Copyright Protecting Our Images © Dave Mullen, all rights reserved


With the advent of digital imaging and reproduction, protecting the use of our images is more important, and difficult, than ever before. Questions about protecting the images published in our SSCC Yearbook led me to think about how you can protect your rights on the web and in print.

Images displayed on the web are generally not of high enough quality to be reproduced with any level of excellence. If you save your web images at a size of 2-3 inches at 72 ppi and a medium or high (i.e., low quality) compression setting, they'll be pretty useless printed beyond that size. Compared to the images you submit in print competitions of 8-10 inches at 300 ppi with a low (high quality) compression setting, the web image will look quite amateurish and unsuitable for much of anything beyond the web. To add a layer of protection, you can put a copyright mark directly on your photo in Photoshop or other imaging program. For school portraits I use a program called Visual Watermark which adds a customized copyright watermark to my proofs before uploading. Alternatively, you can type in your own custom watermark in Photoshop and play with the style and opacity. True Photoshop jockeys can create an action, script, or droplet which does what Visual Watermark does, but it's worth \$20 to me not to have to re-teach myself how to do that once a year. Less difficult is creating a copyright brush in Photoshop with which you can place your watermark wherever you'd like it within your image. Ultimately, however, your image does not have copyright protection unless you've registered it with the United States Copyright Office. Here's how to do that:

- 1) Go to <u>www.copyright.gov</u>.
- 2) Choose how you'll register: online (Form eCO) or via mail (Form CO or VA).
- 3) Complete the application.
- 4) Upload your images or burn a CD of them, and mail with the application to the Copyright Office.
- 5) Pay the application fee: \$35 for electronic registration or \$45 for mailed registration.
- 6) Check your mail for the Certificate of Registration.



Please include your name and the image title in the filename. First place winners are invited to write a brief blurb about the taking of the photograph. Even simpler ... follow the **Digital Competition Guidelines!**

Article submission suggestions

Articles for the Cable Release can be on any photography related topic. It may run the month following submission, or may run in a later issue depending on space availability. Topics might include your member profile, gear review, a magazine review, a camera, flash, or Photoshop technique, places you've shot, why you like (or dislike) it, and how to get there., exhibits you've seen, upcoming exhibits that others might like to see, calls for entries, photolabs (online or local), what you like/ dislike, classes and/or workshops you've taken. Please submit in Word, WordPerfect, or raw text format without font or other formatting.

Adding Your Competition Winners To the Web Site

A gallery has been set up for competition winners on the SSCC Web site at <u>www.ssccphotography.org</u>. Here's how to add *your* winning photo to the gallery.

1. Login and upload your photos. Go to "My Account" on the menu across the top, and select "My Image Library". Fill in the title of your image, and use the "Owner Image ID" field to record the award information for example "April 2009 Advanced Color 1st Prize." Click on the "Browse" button and find your image file on your computer. When you're finished, click on the "Add this Image" button and wait for your file to upload. (HINT- the upload will be much faster if you use your image editing software to resize your photos so that the longest dimension is about 1000 pixels.) Repeat this process until all your winners have been uploaded. **2.** Go to "My Account" and select "My Galleries" Find the Gallery named "April (or current month) Competition Winners" and click on the pencil icon under the "Edit" column.

3. Once the Gallery page opens, scroll down to the bottom of the page and click on "Add Images." Your Image Library will open with a check box next to each picture that says "Selected." Click on the box next to each of your winners to add them to the gallery. When you're done, go to the bottom of the page and click on "Finished Marking Desired Images."

4. Check to make sure that your images are now shown in the gallery, and you are done. The gallery is marked "unapproved," because once a gallery has been approved for public display, photos cannot be added. The gallery will be approved for display after the following weekend, so please upload your images before the 20th of each month.




