All three major monthly meetings for this Club Year will be held at the Marvin Memorial United Methodist Church at Four Corners in Silver Spring. **Directions:**


From downtown Silver Spring: Go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.


From Wheaton and points west of Four Corners: Go east on University Blvd. Pass through Route 29 intersection and turn left into parking lot A.

President's Column Carl Brandt



What was your first camera? Mine was a folding "Vest Pocket" Kodak, borrowed from my mother. With it, at age 11, I even did my first wedding photography.

I got my first new camera, a folding 2 1/4 x 3 1/4 roll film Kodak Tourist with an f4.5 manual focus lens, back in 1948. Wonder of wonders: I could then take an action photo with a synchronized flashbulb at 1/200 sec! Among other things, I

used that camera to make hundreds of photos for the University of Connecticut newspaper.

Digital enlargements of a couple dozen of those college photos, along with my printed comments, were put on exhibit last Spring in time for the 60th reunion of my class of 1949. Aerial photos that I made of the campus during various low-level flights on Sunday mornings apparently were a particular "hit" with those who saw that show, and several of those photos likely will remain on permanent display at UConn.

On a different topic: How many of you ever loaded your own 35 mm film cartridges? In the days when I was using the Korean War GI Bill to help pay my graduate student fees, I did just that, loading empty cartridges from 100 foot rolls of Plus X film. It saved money and let me take photos when funds were in short supply.

Those were the "good old days" when I didn't yet have a phone, a car, a wife, or even my own typewriter.

Guest Speaker: December 3 Michael Starghill

Michael Starghill is an energetic young man of 26 who began chasing his dream of becoming a documentary and sports photographer just four short years ago. While experimenting with photography in college, Michael visited a Georgetown gallery for a homework assignment. Photoshop Tip of the Month

Give Your Photos An Extra Pop

For a photograph that's dull-looking despite increased the saturation and contrast, try making a duplicate layer of your photograph (click on the 'Layer' menu at the top of your screen and then click on 'Duplicate Layer'). Name the layer 'Overlay' and set the blending mode to 'Overlay' by clicking on the arrow and then on Overlay. Adjust the opacity to about 50%. (Click on Opacity and then move the slider to 50%). To see the difference this makes, click the "eye" icon on the layers pallet to turn visibility on and off and you'll be able to see the difference this simple yet effective technique makes in the intensity of the colors in your photograph. You can also try setting the blending mode to 'Soft Light' or 'Vivid Light,' but usually Overlay works nicely.



- -How-to Photoshop techniques, step-by-step on how to get some of the different results.
- -A separate version with a minimum of photographs for printing in black and white.

What would you like Dropped?

- -Most, if not all photos, gallery and non-SSCC exhibition info.
- -Calls for Entries should only list title, deadline, and link. Entire description is not necessary.
- -Competition rules and adding winners to the website should not be repeated in each CR, they are on the website if anyone needs them. Some photos could be printed smaller to save space.
- -Classes and Workshops they appear to be a replication of what I see in the Post and various local weekly papers. Also, any items I checked in the first two columns could simply be listed by title along with a hyperlink to the info or article, since most appear on the internet or our website (especially instructions for submitting digital images for monthly competition).
- -Too many lists, such as exhibits and events outside our areas. -Exhibits and Events, Classes and Workshops, Call for Entries, FotoWeek, field trip photos, 3rd Thursday, Magical Montgomery articles could be shortened and links provided to the SSCC Website which could show everything. Also, if an event, workshop, exhibit, etc has it's own "advertisement" it can be omitted elsewhere or vice-versa.
- -Deals of the Month.

Tim Grey's Digital Darkroom Questions

I have the in camera option of saving my files in 12 or 14 bit images. In the real world, what difference does the increased file size make?

Tim's Answer: The actual increase in file size doesn't make any real difference, since that increase in file size is not the result of additional pixels. Instead, it is the result of more decimal places of accuracy (in a manner of speaking) for each of the individual pixel values. So the real question is, is there an appreciable difference between 12-bit per channel and 14-bit per channel color?


In absolute terms, there is a considerable difference. An 8-bit per channel image contains only 256 tonal values per channel, and thus only 16,777,216 million total possible color values. That sounds like a lot (and it is), but it is a small enough number that significant adjustments can lead to posterization (loss of smooth gradations of tone and color within the image). At the top end of "normal" digital photographs is 16-bit per channel, which allows for 281,474,976,710,656 possible color values 65,536 tonal values per channel). With so many colors possible, posterization is highly unlikely even with very strong adjustments to your images.


So, where do 12-bit and 14-bit stack up? A 12-bit per channel image allows for up to 4,096 possible tonal values per channel, and thus a total of about 68.7 billion possible color values. A 14-bit per channel image offers up to 16,384 possible tonal values, for a total of almost 4.4 trillion possible color values. That's a pretty big difference, but frankly in the real world it doesn't amount to a particularly huge difference (at least not anywhere near as big a difference as the numbers presented here would imply).

When applying typical adjustment to an image, you're not going to do enough damage to cause posterization with either a 12-bit per channel or 14-bit per channel image. Because of the additional number of colors available with a 14-bit per channel image it is possible you'll retain greater fine detail within the image. Gradations may be more smooth, and some areas may actually contain more visible detail than if you worked with a 12-bit per channel image. In most cases you would have a very difficult time telling the difference between the two, although in some cases it can make a difference that is clearly visible when you zoom in closely to certain areas of an image.

Despite the fact that there is a very minor benefit in most cases, I do recommend capturing at the highest bit-depth available for your digital camera. Keep in mind that this bit-depth setting affects the accuracy of the analog to digital (A/D) conversion within the camera. The final image you create when you convert the RAW image to a "real" image file format will be either 8-bit per channel (which I don't recommend, as you would be throwing away all the "extra" information you gathered by capturing in RAW) or 16-bit per channel. Photoshop doesn't offer 12-bit or 14-bit per channel file formats, so the 12-bit or 14-bit data will be placed into a 16-bit per channel "package". You don't really have full 16-bit per channel data (though some cameras do offer this support), your data is just held by an image file capable of storing more data than you actually have.

I really enjoy a good walk in the woods to see what is happening in nature. I am typically looking for birds during these walks but also like to keep my eye out for the little critters

that might be there too. Photographing insects is fun but often frustrating because it is hard to identify many of them. I have good books for butterflies but hadn't found a good one for other insects until now! I discovered a BugGuide.net this



summer when surfing the web looking for insect identification resources. It is a great site dedicated to the identifica-



tion and natural history of insects, spiders and other related creatures. They are building a photographic record of these invertebrates across the United States and Canada. Run by a network of volunteers that provide help in identifying critters;

it is a must for bookmarking.

They ask that you spend time working through the <u>Guide</u> to try to identify your organism yourself. I must warn you



that sometime the replies are short and sweet! I worked hard on identifying a really interesting bug and thought I might have it correct. I identified it as a Damsel Bug but the reply was "wings say miridi, antennae say

Neurocolpus." Oh well, maybe next time. They will offer pointers on identification and it is a great chance to double check IDs.

After your critter is correctly identified you have the option of moving the photograph to the library or into "frass" [the garbage can]. They have developed a remarkable library of

photographs and it seems to be growing. The site offers other resources for identification and for learning more about these interesting organisms. If you like to photograph creepy crawly things, check it out, it is free and fun.
