All three major monthly meetings for this Club Year will be held at the Marvin Memorial United Methodist Church at Four Corners in Silver Spring. **Directions:**


From downtown Silver Spring: Go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.

From College Park/Takoma Park: Take University Blvd. West. As you approach Rte. 29, move to the far left lane and turn left into church parking lot B. Or pass through Rte. 29 intersection and turn left at the loop just past McDonalds. Proceed on University Blvd. East, pass through Rte. 29 intersection, and quickly get in the far left lane and enter into church parking lot A.

From points north of Four Corners: Proceed south on Rte. 29 and turn right onto University Blvd. West, move into the far left lane and turn left at the loop just past the McDonalds. Proceed through the Rte. 29 intersection, and turn left into church parking lot A.

From Wheaton and points west of Four Corners: Go east on University Blvd. Pass through Route 29 intersection and turn left into parking lot A.

Wherever you park, walk to the southeast corner of the Church and enter Room 204.

In the 43 or so years since I first joined the Silver Spring Camera Club, I don't recall there ever having been a meeting devoted to motion picture or stereo photography. Over the years I've done both, and way back in 1957 one of my 8mm silent movies even won a competition award in the Boston Camera Club. Our club probably isn't yet ready for video or stereo competitions, but I'll bet

quite a few members would enjoy a future program devoted to each of these topics.

Especially if you have young children (or grandchildren) you should record their antics in video. You don't have a video camera? Actually, if you have a digital "still" camera, you likely do. Take a good look at that round dial on the camera top or back; I'll bet it has a video setting. But if not, or if you want a really compact video camera, consider buying one of the Flip video camera series. They're relatively inexpensive, easily fit into a small pocket, and they produce quite nice video images with sound. In fact, one of my prized possessions is about 60 seconds of Flip video that I took of my wife Elsa, a few months before she died, as she commented to a group of parents and students on the joys of teaching violin to children.

Frank Van Riper and Judith Goodman are husband and wife documentary and fine art photographers whose work has been published internationally. Goodman's photography has hung in the Corcoran Gallery

of Art in Washington, DC and the Baltimore Museum; Van Riper's is in the permanent collections of the National Museum of American Art and the National Portrait Gallery, as well as the Portland (ME) Gallery of Art. His 1998 book of photography and essays,



Down East Maine/A World Apart, was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize and won the silver medal for photogra-



phy from the Art Director's Club of Washington. They are the co-authors of Serenissima: Venice in Winter, a coffee table book of black and white photographs and essays that has just been published in the United States and in Italy. Frank Van Riper also is

the photography columnist of the Washington Post (www.TalkingPhotography.com) and a widely sought after teacher and lecturer. He is on the faculty of PhotoWorks at Glen Echo Park, Md. and has lectured widely, including at the Maine Photographic Workshops. In 2007 he was awarded the Distinguished Achievement Award from the University of Maine at Machias for his "outstanding career in journalism and photography."

Field Trip: May 15 Fort Washington

Fort Washington has stood as a silent sentry defending the Nation's Capital for over 180 years. Nearly 12 miles down the Potomac River, the fort was built to guard against enemy ships during the War of 1812. As technologies advanced, so did Fort Washington, which is one of the few remaining Seacoast Forts still in its original design. At the beginning of the



Civil War, Fort Washington was the only existing fortification defending the capital.

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

As always, the October theme will be *Nature*, and the remaining months will be *Open*.

Final Call For Entries

SSCC Year End Competition Deadline: Thursday, May 13

The deadline for submission of images for the Year-End Competition is Thursday, May 13, 2010 at the Club competition meeting. You may also enter earlier, during the Club meeting on Thursday May 6. Michael Tran or Mark Ratner will be available to accept your images. If it is impossible to submit images by the deadline date please let Michael Tran know ASAP to make alternate arrangements. Judging will take place prior to the annual Banquet, with winners announced at the Banquet.

Year-End Competition Rules

1. Each member may enter a maximum of five images per category in the year-end competition.

2. Year-end competitions have the same rules as monthly competitions with respect to categories and classes.

3. All entries in year-end competitions must have been entered in a monthly competition or as an SSCC entry in an interclub competition during the preceding nine months. However, entries that have won an award in a previous SSCC year-end competition are ineligible.

4. No points will be considered or awarded.

5. A member who has entered in both the Novice and Advanced Class of a category during the preceding year may elect to enter either the Novice or the Advanced class (but not both) for the year-end competition. If a member enters the Advanced class, he or she may submit any entry previously entered regardless of class. However, if a member enters the Novice class, he or she may submit only entries previously entered in the Novice class.

6. Awards will be distributed on the following basis: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and a variable number of HM's equal to 10% of the total entries in that competition, rounded up from odd multiples of five.

7. The Len Tuchin Award will be presented to the maker of the image that, in the opinion of the judge(s) of the Year-End Competition, is considered to be the "Best of Show."



Tim Grey's Digital Darkroom Questions

Today's Question:


In the early days of digital printing there was a lot of discussion in this forum on the need to degas prints before mounting behind glass. It was advised to cover the print with paper for a couple of days before mounting. With the latest pigmented inks, such as the Epson Ultrachrome inks, has this overcome the problem of glass-fogging that was seen earlier?

Tim's Answer:

This is indeed one of those subjects that generated a huge amount of discussion when it first became known to a large number of photographers, and recently it seems you don't really hear anyone talking about it. However, the issue of print out-gassing most certainly still exists. Even the latest inks still contain glycol and other chemicals that vary in their evaporation times. If a print is framed behind glass before these chemicals have had a chance to fully evaporate, over time they can leave a residue on the inside of the glass, which is relatively easy to see and can distract from the appearance of the print.

To resolve this issue, it is best to place sheets of absorbent paper over the print for 48 hours, changing to fresh sheets of paper after 24 hours. I use standard copier paper for this purpose, but you could use any uncoated and absorbent paper. You'll likely notice that the paper starts to wrinkle due to absorbing the chemicals. After about 48 hours of this process it is generally safe to frame the print behind glass, although in areas with higher humidity I would tend to allow extra time.

Persons depicted in this body of work include



"It is easy to love this Park for its many precious historical structures and superb access to nature. The C&O Canal represents core American history; it is a national treasure that we should preserve forever.




Early Images of the Western U.S. Bill Rau

Timothy O'Sullivan had photographed during the Civil War and was chosen to be the official photographer during two geologic surveys in the American West, in the late 1860s and mid-1870s. A selection from the 400 photographs (all that exist from those multi-year journeys) from those surveys is on display at the Smithsonian American Art Museum at Gallery Place. The exhibit closes May 6th.

What I find wonderful about O'Sullivan's photos are the sharpness of the images. Small details in the rock formations and vast landscapes are easily visible. Also, in contrast to so much of the West today, his images are not cluttered or constrained by elements of what we call "civilization." There are no electrical or barbed wire fences, no roads or ATV tracks marring the landscape, and no vacation homes scattered across the land.

In a symposium to discuss O'Sullivan's photography, several authorities noted that he had been careful to illustrate the vastness and openness of the West that he saw. But this had a purpose: to add to the impression that large sections of the West were open to American exploitation. The emptiness O'Sullivan portrays was, in fact, a part of the myth associated with the colonial expansion of the U.S., ignoring or dismissing the presence of Native peoples, wildlife, and existing small settlements. As subsequent history showed, all these were swept aside in favor of mines, railways, roads, dams and other economic infrastructure.

Nonetheless, O'Sullivan's photos are important for seeing a portion of the West that partially still exists, and where it does not to remind us of what we have lost. The photos are also important as evidence of an early and very skillful landscape photographer.


PSA News Michael Koren, PSA Representative

Where I Shoot: A Maine Invitation Sandy Littlejohn


