Directions:


From downtown Silver Spring: Go north on Colesville Road (Rte. 29); take a right onto University Blvd. East; then left into the church parking lot A.





May Field Trip Patuxent Wildlife Refuge Ted Ringger





I have not been the most faithful SSCC field trip participant in the brief span of my membership. I went to the National Cathedral last year because it is one of my favorite places, but I have been AWOL ever since.

I wanted to go to the National Wildlife Visitor Center [http://www.fws.gov/northeast/patuxent/vcdefault.html] as I was trained as an ecologist and always appreciated that there could be a place like that right in the middle of our developed region. There is also a professional connection for me since I was part of a team of Baltimore Gas & Electric environmental people who built a new wetland on the Patuxent property fifteen years ago.

Since the Visitor Center is closer to my home than our usual morning meeting place, I went straight there. Apparently the rain cancelled the field trip, as I found myself

alone! However, I was already there, I had a slicker and umbrella and tripod for the gloomy light in the woods, so why not see what we could find?

Fortunately it didn't rain much the rest of the morning. The tripod was indispensible with the poor light, especially in the woods. It was also fortunate that my D-300 was set to auto-bracket three versions of every shot since a number of the over-exposed images looked better on this dark day.

As expected, the trail around Cash Lake was not busy. only a couple of birders and strollers were encountered in two hours. There was nothing spectacular to see in the way of wildlife or vegetation, but the constant sounds of birds and frogs confirmed this was a refuge for creatures in our otherwise crowded and fractured landscape, and one I will return to in the fall when the color should be spectacular.

Tim Grey's Digital Darkroom Questions

I'm not sure the best way to blend two images taken to extend the dynamic range, one for highlights the other for shadows, without using HDR techniques. Could you give me your step by step recommendation to achieve this?

Tim's Answer: In basic concept, this is actually rather straightforward. The challenge is in getting the two images to blend together seamlessly, which will vary in difficulty depending on the nature of the scene and the match of the two images.

The first step, of course, is capturing the two images. In theory you could also convert the same RAW capture in two different ways (one bright, one dark), but this doesn't provide as much potential range of tonal values in the final result. When you capture two images, naturally you'll want to use a tripod, being careful to ensure no movement that would cause the images to not align (including changes in zoom setting, focus, or movement of the camera or tripod). I prefer to use exposure bracketing whenever possible both to automate the process and to ensure the images are captured in rapid succession, but you could certainly make manual adjustments in between exposures as well.

With the two images captured, the next step is to assemble them into a multi-layered document in Photoshop. I prefer to take an automated approach here, so I'll either select the two images in the Library module in Lightroom and choose Photo > Edit In > Open as Layers in Photoshop, or select the images in Bridge and choose Tools > Photoshop > Load Files into Photoshop Layers. In either case, the images will be opened and blended as individual layers in a new document.

At this point you are ready to create a layer mask in order to blend the two layers. In effect, the bottom-most layer on the Layers panel will become the base layer for the overall image, and the upper layer will be used to fill in additional details. For example, let's assume in this case that the underlying image contains the detail for the darker areas of the scene (the foreground in general, let's assume), and the upper image contains detail for the brighter areas of the scene (let's assume the sky).

For the upper image, you would then want to create a selection of the sky (perhaps using the Quick Selection tool, though there are certainly many other options). Once the selection is created and cleaned up to the best of your ability, and with that top layer selected on the Layers panel, click the Add Layer Mask button (the circle inside a square icon) at the bottom of the Layers panel. This will add a layer mask to the layer based on the selection, so that in this example only the sky is visible. That means the result blends the sky from the upper image with the foreground of the image below.

Of course, at this point the transition between the two areas of the image may be a bit rough. With the layer mask active (you can click on the thumbnail of the layer mask associated with the upper layer to make sure), go to the Masks panel (choose Window > Masks if it isn't visible) and click the Mask Edge button to bring up the Refine Mask dialog. You'll certainly want to increase the value for Feather at least a little in order to blend the transition between the two images. You may also need to adjust the Shift Edge setting after applying the Feather adjustment, in order to position the transition more accurately. And with fuzzy objects along the edge (a row of trees, perhaps), you may need to use the Refine Radius tool in order to paint into areas that require additional blending.

This is of course, an overview of the relatively basic process. In some cases this will provide an ideal solution, and in other cases additional work may be needed. And keep in mind that you may need to apply adjustments that affect individual layers, as well as additional adjustments that affect the overall image, in order to produce the best final result.




