The topic this month (and alternating months) is: "Open." Anything goes, as long as the original file was created by a light sensitive device, like a camera or scanner. Any amount of Photoshop or other software manipulation is permissible (if not always advisable!). The competition themes for the rest of the year are as follows:

- December: Industrial / Mechanical
- February: Still Lifes
- April: Landscapes
- May: Black and White / Monochrome

SEPTEMBER SPEAKER - BOB CATLETT

This season, we'll be trying some new approaches to Speaker's Night. Of course we'll still have our roster of pros who address various kinds of photography (e.g., food, black & white, nature, etc.). But we start the club year with a special treat: a look at the work of SSCC's Bob Catlett, in his own words. He'll not only show us examples of his work, but he'll also explain his techniques for creating such images. Bob has been a member of SSCC since 1982, just about longer than any other current member. And over

these 30+ years, Bob has grown to be one of the finest of the club's photographers.

When he was still in high school, Bob discovered photography and bought a contact printer for 620 film. That was the beginning. His first 35mm camera was a Vivitar; his next was a Pentax Spotmatic. Today, Bob shoots Nikon and has enough bodies, lenses, filters, lighting equipment, and accessories – not to mention computers and back-up storage devices – to fill a couple of large closets.



For formal training, Bob took some photography classes at Montgomery College after finishing his college studies in criminal law at Howard University and American University. But he probably learned just as much about photography from examining the landscapes of Ansel Adams, the vegetable images of Edward Weston, and the flowers of Robert Mapplethorpe.

What are Bob's favorite subjects? From what we've seen of his work in club competitions, his first love is nature – anything from wide open expanses of landscapes to jewel-like detail of macro shots of flowers. He especially enjoys the constant changes in nature subjects, seasonal changes and changes in the light and shadows depending on the time of day. But Bob is almost as happy in a studio environment and has spent a lot of time experimenting with figure studies. As outgoing as Bob is, it's no surprise that he also enjoys photographing people, capturing just the right expression that reveals a person's essence.

Along with Bob's career, first with the Metropolitan Police Force and then the Federal Reserve Bank, he found time to serve SSCC. He was treasurer for eight years, vice-president for two years, and field trip chairman for well over 10 years. Now, Bob serves the club as a director and uses his long experience with SSCC to advise the officers and committee chairmen of our board.

One of Bob Catlett's golden characteristics is his unfailing generosity with information and willingness to help other photographers, no matter what their level. Thank you, Bob!

JOSH TAYLOR: FIRST JUDGE FOR 2015-2016

It's always fun when Josh Taylor comes to judge an SSCC competition. And we learn a lot, too! To kick off our new season, Josh has again agreed to judge our first open-topic competition. Many of us know Josh not only because he's judged for the club before but also because we've taken workshops with him. In fact, his workshops around Brookside Gardens and especially of Brookside's butterfly exhibit are now established institutions. His in-the-field guidance, followed by critiques at the computer indoors, have proven to be a popular education experience.

Besides Brookside, Josh has presented photography workshops at the Smithsonian National Orchid Show, US National Arboretum, US Botanic Garden, Sarah P. Duke Gardens, American Horticultural Society Garden School, Adkins Arboretum, and Longwood Gardens. In addition to being a Canon Camera instructor, Josh speaks at camera and garden clubs, judges photographic competitions, and exhibits his photographs in gallery shows. He is a member of Garden Writers Association, National Association of Photoshop Professionals, and member and past president of the Northern Virginia Photographic Society. Josh was voted best garden club speaker in 2005. He was also a judge for the 2009 Garden Writers Association National Media Awards and the 2010 Mid-Atlantic Nature Photography Expo. Longwood Gardens chose Josh as its Instructor of the Month (October 2010), and he was a selected photographer to assist the public at Longwood in photographing Bruce Munro's Light: Installations (2012).

SSCC FIELD TRIP

FIELD TRIP TO THE NATIONAL ARBORETUM Washington, DC, September 26, 2015

The United States National Arboretum is a site run by the Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service, and its main mission is education and research. It has 446 acres and 9.5 miles of meandering roads. It is laid out as a very large park with paddocks, forested areas, ponds, and groves. Besides the various areas focused on particular types



of plants, there are large Chinese and Japanese Bonsai collections, a herb garden, and a pond with *koi*.



Looking a bit like part of the Acropolis, there is an area with standing columns that has absolutely nothing to do with trees or plants or anything remotely agricultural. This cluster of 22 sandstone Corinthian columns that sit in an exposed field once supported the roof of the US Capitol's East Portico and were the backdrop of

presidential inaugurations from Andrew Jackson in 1826 to Dwight Eisenhower in 1957 (inauguration ceremonies switched to the western side of the Capitol with Reagan's 1981 swearing in). In 1958, work began on an extension to the Capitol, and the columns were replaced by sturdier marble reproductions. The original columns were put into storage, and 22 of the original 24 were salvaged in the 1980s and installed in a paddock in the National Arboretum. It is a lot of fun to take photos of them.

How to get there:

The Arboretum has two entrances: one at 3501 New York Avenue, NE, and the other at 24th & R Streets, NE, off of Bladensburg Road (<u>http://www.usna.usda.gov/Information/directions.html</u>). The most practical way to get there is by car. Inside the Arboretum, there is a trolley that does tours around the park, so you'll still be able to see things without walking for miles.

There's no problem using a tripod or flash, and you can wander about pretty much anywhere.

For those interested in carpooling, we will meet at 8:30am in the Giant parking lot on Arliss Road in Silver Spring.


PHOTOGRAPHY OF PERSONAL ADORNMENT - PHOTOGRAPHIC TECHNIQUES FOR JEWELRY/ARTWEAR CRAFTSPEOPLE, RESEARCHERS, SCHOLARS AND MUSEUM/GALLERY STAFF by Robert K. Liu, Ph.D., Ornament, Inc., 2014.

A Book Review by David Terao

Unless you are a jeweler or metalsmith, you probably haven't heard of *Ornament* magazine. Because my wife is a metalsmith, I've had the opportunity to glance through many issues of *Ornament* looking at the beautifully photographed jewelry pieces and wondering, "How did they ever photograph those jewelry pieces to look so stunning?" I've been photographing jewelry for over 15 years now, and I still admire the photography in *Ornament*. Although there are many articles written about photographing jewelry, there are very few, if any, books written specifically on this highly specialized subject.

In his book, Photography of Personal Adornment, Dr. Robert Liu covers a variety of topics for photographing decorative art wear (i.e., jewelry and clothing). However, this is not just another photography book. And, the term, "variety" is a gross understatement. Although his book primarily covers photographing jewelry, he provides a comprehensive description of not only how to shoot various types of jewelry-including ancient, ethnographic, and contemporary jewelry-but, also addresses the challenges of photographing the many different types of materials from which jewelry is made. He discusses what type of photographic equipment he uses as well as various background materials and other props. He describes how to shoot jewelry on different types of background materials as well as on live models in the studio. He covers how to photograph ancient jewelry in museums. He describes how to shoot jewelry for magazine covers and for advertisements. He even discusses how to photograph artists' studios and art-wear events.



Robert Liu and his wife, Carolyn Benesh, are co-editors of *Ornament* magazine, which he founded in the 1970's. He has been photographing much of the jewelry himself in the magazine for over 40 years. In his book, Dr. Liu reveals all the secrets he learned over those 40 years and includes more than 500 photos in his book of how to (and how not to) shoot jewelry. Dr. Liu is a selftaught photographer and a renowned jeweler himself. Reading his book is an education in both photography and jewelry-making. Although the book is over 150 pages in length, the actual text in each section is not lengthy with sample photos and explanatory captions occupying most of the pages. It is written in plain English without a lot of photographic jargon and technical details that typically confuse most artists.

For photographers, the book contains a wealth of information on photographing jewelry that cannot be found in any other existing photography or jewelry book. It would be informative not only for "jewelry/artwear craftspeople, researchers, scholars and museum/gallery staff," but also for experienced jewelry photographers, as well as photographers looking to venture into the world of jewelry photography.


SOUTHWEST VISIONS by Michael Lux





















SUMMER by Karen Carkhuff



Even if all I could see was distant silhouettes, the body language was clearly romantic. All I needed to do was move across the top steps of the Memorial enough to make them stand out in the light.







- File Format: JPEG
- File Size: 500 KB (max)
- File Name: Level ~Maker's Name~Image Title.jpg
 - Example: Advanced~Tom Jones~Washington Landscape.jpg
 - The tilde "~" character separates the 3 sub-fields of the file name
 - Level "Novice" or "Advanced" (capitalization not required)
 - Maker's Name spaces allowed
 - $\circ\,$ Please use the same name throughout the year to aid record keeping.
 - Image Title spaces allowed

DO NOT embed commas (,) or tilde (\sim) in any of the File Name subfields.

The "**File Name"** requirements are very important for running the competition. Please be careful when entering this information. Nonconforming filenames make it very difficult to track your entry. Use a tilde (~), NOT a dash (-) to separate the subfields (**Level~Maker's Name~Image Title**) of the filename. The Competition Chair will not make changes to the filenames after submission, so please check them carefully before submitting.

The computer and software will automatically rescale your image for projection, but if you want to exert full control over how the image is displayed, you should consider resizing and sharpening the image (maximum of 1024 pixels wide and 768 pixels high) yourself. Please see the *Member Handbook* (http://www.ssccphotography.org/wp-content/uploads/2014/08/SSCC-Member-Handbook2014.pdf) for tutorials on how to resize images in Lightroom or Photoshop.

The maximum file size of **500KB** is to limit the demands on computer memory and speed the presentation.

The computer we use for competition night will automatically add black bars at the side of the photo based on the photo's aspect ratio. If for artistic reasons you wish your image to be presented at a size smaller than screen's full height or width, then you must size you image and position it within a 1024 pixels wide x 768 pixels high **<u>black</u>** background image (canvas size in Photoshop).
